Hybrid Meeting Logistics – Pablo Martin (5 mins. plus 5 mins. Q&C)

- Again, you can find the process here for <u>signing up to attend A.S. meetings</u> remotely
  - a. Note that we are not going to follow up with folx to confirm their meeting modality after this first meeting
- 2. Unless they informed the A.S. Secretary otherwise before the agenda was published, Senators must attend remotely from the address on their form
- 3. All Senators participating remotely must have their camera on
- 4. Voting: The A.S. President will restate the motion after discussion has closed and call for the vote. If asked, the Secretary will type the resolution out on the projector or shared screen.
  - a. Senators will be asked for objections and abstentions first, giving Senators 30 seconds to cast their vote.
  - b. We will only ask for "yay" votes if there are objections (so that the required role call vote can simply be "unanimous" when possible).
  - c. Remote Senators will use the following "Zoom Reactions": the green "yes" button, the red "no" button, the "raise your hand" button to abstain, and Senators voting by proxy will indicate their vote in the chat (i.e. "Pablo Martin votes yes/no/abstains").

Follow Up: 8-Week Courses, District-wide Class Caps, Webpages for Departments/Disciplines – Pablo Martin (5 mins. plus 5 mins. Q&C)

Update on Faculty input re. 8-Week Courses

- We should survey students to find out what they want, too
- Several senators shared that they like and support 8 week courses; they would also like to see more 12 week courses
- A recommendation was made to be more purposeful with them, pairing GE
  courses more. More meaningful pairing of 8-week courses would make these
  more effective and impactful. We could start in Humanities, building upon skills
  in a semester/year by sequencing the courses.
- Another senator stressed that students need to clearly understand that an 8week course will have the same course/workload as a 16-week class in half the time.
- Students seem to like to sign up for them, but many students are not prepared
  for the pace. We would suggest better communication strategies surrounding the
  reality of 8-week classes, perhaps from counselors, on our website, on the first
  day of class (though ideally well before then for obvious reasons), or in other
  orientation-specific venues.
- Among the students who love it, they talk about how they usually take fewer classes at the same time, as they are staggering them between the first 8 week session and the second 8 week session. It allows them to have fewer homework and assignments deadlines to manage at the same time, so it helps with their organizational and prioritizing skills. Those students usually report that the intensity and frequency of classes for an 8 week session allows them to focus on fewer topics at a time and not forget as there is less time in between class meetings. When it comes to summer classes, which follows the 8 week format, many students who are attending a 4 year school take science classes at Miramar during the summer. They say that the classes are smaller and they get more one on one attention than in the big university labs and classrooms.
- Among the students who do not love the 8 week format, it usually comes down to having to handle the same amount of content and material but twice as fast.
   For some students, the pace is just too fast and they need more time to process the information.
- I would add that because the 8 week format is faster, timely communications between students and instructors is very important, especially in the beginning of the semester. Students may have questions about the syllabus and if they do not get a timely answer, they end up dropping the class to avoid a withdrawal or a substandard grade. The 12 week format is also really nice for students who may have dropped classes the first two weeks, need to add more units and want a compromise between a 16 week class and an 8 week.

### <u>Update on Faculty input re. District-wide Class Caps</u>

There wasn't much input on this topic at our last Meeting, but some faculty

- shared their input directly with me after the meeting
- There is concern that the higher caps will be set as the default in implementing district-wide caps. We see the value in caps, but we want to ensure the caps that support quality learning are used as the ceiling.
- FYI (from meeting with VC Topham and Victor DeVore): This is a big issue and involves a lot of moving pieces—perhaps this should wait until all of the colleges have a better idea of what their SEM and other student success Plans will look like. They are developing the Ad Astra software to be able to help us identify areas of need and how we might best address those.
- The ASP at Mesa suggested that we need to be looking at Curriculum and meeting future student need so that we don't have to worry about class cancellations, etc.
- We're trying to work on our infrastructure, such as shoring up Financial Aid, so that we are ready when the SCFF is in place. If it seems that enrollment isn't a priority, this is one reason.

#### <u>Update on Faculty input re. Academic Webpages (for Schools and Departments)</u>

- We need to know who the audience is for our website and these webpages and build them accordingly
- Desire for uniformity by web managers has been a point of frustration and could continue to be an issue. Faculty would like more flexibility in their webpages (perhaps they could provide a freeform "box" like the basic pages have?)
- Petti reported that Chairs are supportive but want assurance that they would have edit access. Other faculty expressed the same concern about editing.
- It will be important to make sure that how to find pages and information is clear for students. The structure needs to make sense and ensure connection between pages

# (First Call) Development of an 8-Week Course & A.A. Workgroup — Pablo Martin (5 mins. plus 5 mins. Q&C)

Notes: Chancellor Cortez wants us to prepare students for "high wage, high demand jobs" as well as CTE (if students take 12 units of CTE credit, we benefit on the SCFF); we should package programs for both online and FTF students; he also wants to see cohorts and highly-structured programs that students could opt-out of rather than opt into

- 1. President Wes would like faculty input in exploring this (and expanding it beyond CTE to transfer degrees)
- 2. Let's be mindful of why we offer 8-Week Classes now:
  - a. To help students get a fresh start with a class they're struggling in
  - b. To help students finish certain requirements in one semester (like English,

- for example)
- c. To address low-enrolled classes, changing a 16-week course into a 2<sup>nd</sup> session 8-week course
- 3. What would a workgroup look like? counselors, one prof per department, Deans
- 4. We need a commitment around enrollment: What's our climate regarding numbers? Are we still going for 10K or are we ok with 8-9K?

  If it's intentional, and not "every discipline has to offer 8 week courses" then this could work.
- 5. Discussing it in A.S. Exec, it sounds like the college needs to host a high level workgroup to sort out these questions—we need to be more intentional with this; some courses/disciplines work better than others, we need to figure out what those are.
- 6. What does this body believe the next step should be?

### **President's Report: State, District, Campus, and Senate Issues**

- 1. Important <u>SDMC ISER Accreditation Report 3rd Draft</u>: I was under the impression that the Accreditation Steering Committee was still soliciting input from folx on the third draft of the ISER Accreditation report, meaning it would not be up for a first reading. However, in terms of content and structural elements, this document is the final draft and it turns out they were asking for a first read at today's meeting. Given their timeline, they are seeking approval at our April 4 meeting. Given that the ISER has come before this body and been available to the entire campus at least twice before now, I am comfortable putting this on our agenda for approval (aka a "second read") at our April 4 meeting. Do folx have concerns about that? If so, and you don't wish to raise them here, please email me ASAP. Timeline for input is as follows:
  - a. May 2022: 1<sup>st</sup> draft of the ISER document emailed, survey monkey for input, public forum
  - b. October 2022: 2<sup>nd</sup> draft of the ISER document emailed, survey monkey for input, with a second public forum on 11/2/22
  - c. February 24, 2023: 3<sup>rd</sup> draft of the ISER shared with the college with directions for feedback
- 2. Interested in serving on A.S. Exec?
  - a. The E.C. will open nominations in the first meeting of April and then vote at the second meeting of April
  - b. Include the positions and job descriptions (with note on changes to roles, VP, elect, etc.)
- 3. A.S. scholarship applications: We'd like one more person to help us review

- scholarships; contact me if you're interested (the deadline for candidate selection is Wednesday, March 10, 2023)
- 4. Starting on 3/27/23, students will only receive email communication from SDCCD through their SDCCD email accounts.

  - a. Reg-E/Portal Drop "survey": This is an operational decision made at the district level after going through each college's student services council. Get questions from Victor DeVore
    - i. Colleges have access to this information (only the VPIs, VPSSs, and Deans of Institutional Research have access to this data). The dashboard does not include those dropped by faculty, these are only student-initiated. Follow-up surveys can be administered at the college level, so we can determine if students dropped because the course was too difficult or they didn't like the instructor.
    - ii. Does it apply to withdrawals? Yes, any time they drop, they must answer the questions on the drop-down menu
  - iii. What are the questions? The menu options were based on a previous withdrawal survey from Research (Victor will send them to me)
  - iv. Was AFT involved? No
  - b. Auto-Enrollment, or "Extended automated enrollment": Operational folx at the District are cautious about implementation; Topham and DeVore will develop a draft workgroup they'll email around to us. Once we approve it, we will share it with other committees. It looks like the focus of the workgroup will be on research.
