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One of three credit colleges within the San Diego Community College District, San Diego Miramar College offers associate degrees, certificates of completion, and the first two years of a bachelor's degree. Founded in 1969, and located in Mira Mesa, the college services 16,000 students annually with 42 programs that offer 75 associate degrees and 97 career technical education certificates.

Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal (ABA approved), aviation (FAA-certified), automotive, diesel and advanced transportation and energies. Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Energy Center and the San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute, which comprises the San Diego Law Enforcement Academy and the Fire Technology & EMT program. Since 1969, the college has provided training for nearly all law enforcement and firefighters in San Diego County, Miramar College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

P. Wesley Lundburg, Ph.D.

I am pleased to share with you this Report to the Community and some highlights from the 2022-2023 academic year. This past academic year had all of us at the College feeling more like the pre-pandemic "good ole days." Enrollment trended up and the demand for students to return to campus for instruction was noticeable. Now that we have moved past the pandemic, we've gotten back to the basics, how can we better support ALL our students?

We have worked closely with local partners and government officials to unearth more funding. The academic year started with a sizable grant from local assemblyman Brian Maienschein to upgrade resources for our Veteran and active duty military students and their dependents. The funding was part of Governor Gavin Newsom's 2022-2023 state budget. These funds have provided enhanced services and infrastructure for the College's military community. Miramar College is using a majority of the funding to renovate and complete its long planned Veterans Resource Center, now located on the ground floor of the I-Building, with continued expansion in the works. With our close proximity to MCAS Miramar and the surrounding community, we are delighted to upgrade this area of campus as well as our on-base presence and service at MCAS in support of our military-affiliated students.

For the first time, Miramar College joined its fellow San Diego Community College District institutions as a Hispanic Serving Institution. We accepted a \$2.7 million DHSI/STEM Éxito Project grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant allows the college to participate in the development of expanding programs and improving Latino/a and low income students' success outcomes, specifically in STEM fields.

We also started off the year launching a Program Mapper to assist students on a Guided Pathway to degree or certificate completion. While we love having our students around, our focus is to get them graduated and out into the workforce or on their way to a university. The Program Mapper provides students an access tool that allows for exploration of the degree and certificate options available to them. Students will find the Program Mapper organized into groups of similar programs, or what we call academic and career pathways (ACP's). This ACP project took a lot of work on behalf of the college faculty and leadership. And we are proud of the progress we've made on it!

Guided Pathways is an on-going California Community College Chancellor's Office initiative that is a structure to provide all students with clear enrollment avenues, course-taking patterns and support services.

There are so many good things happening on campus that will benefit the community! We hope you can stop on by and say hello!

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

Yuhan Liu is Winning in Her Own Lane

"She silently stepped out of the race that she never wanted to be in, found her own lane and proceeded to win."

Lately, quotes like the one above are providing Miramar College student Yuhan Liu with the motivation to follow her dreams. While Liu's education and employment aspirations are relatively straightforward (complete her Business Administration associates program and obtain work in the same field), her journey toward these goals requires a custom-made route.

As a student with cerebral palsy, Liu must pace herself, taking no more than two courses per semester in order to maintain a great GPA.

"It may take other students an hour to complete an assignment, but for me it may take three or four," she said.

In addition to building a sustainable schedule, Liu ensures a successful academic experience by connecting with professors before each semester begins to arrange all necessary accommodations. For so many students with disabilities, this proactive approach can make all the difference in navigating college life.

Still, certain assumptions persist in the classroom that are beyond Liu's control.

"I would like staff and classmates to not underestimate me when they meet me for the first time," she said. "It may look like I can't do the assignment or participate in the class discussion, but in reality I can. It just takes a little more time."

Driving Her Own Destiny

Liu noted that her ability to attend college is made possible through <u>Miramar's Disability Support Services and Programs (DSPS)</u>.

While DSPS indeed provides a strong support system to help reduce common education and employment barriers, Isabelle Martin, Liu's DSPS counselor, gives her all the credit for driving her own destiny.

"She was still in high school and a few months away from graduation," said Martin, recalling their first meeting in 2017. "She wanted to inquire about DSPS services and assess the differences between high school and college. That's when I discovered that she takes school seriously and that she likes to be prepared to ensure her success."

Initially, Martin assisted Liu by acting as the primary liaison between the student and her professors and helping create an individualized strategy for accommodations (particularly with test taking and classroom participation).

"I feel privileged that [she] trusted me to advocate on her behalf," said Martin.

As Liu's self-advocacy skills developed, she became more comfortable and confident articulating her needs with instructors, whom, according to Martin, "have always had positive comments about her class participation."

"Her positivity makes it easy to tackle any situations that come along the way," said Martin. She is determined and a hard worker."

A Trail Blazed

Liu's hard work and determination reach beyond the classroom; she also utilizes these traits to gain relevant work experience in her desired career field.

"I did two internships with <u>Upkey</u> last year," she said. "The first was all about different kinds of jobs and careers that are available in the business field. The second was mainly focused on marketing. I was able to do a few projects for Upkey during my two internships. I think I would take the leadership skills with me to my next place of employment."

As Liu moves toward her degree and career, she is already putting those leadership skills to good use. In Spring 2021, she shared her perspective at Miramar's Campus-wide Planning Summit as well as the District-wide **DSPS Advisory Committee** Meeting. These events rely on perspectives like Liu's to ensure that DSPS shapes its programs around the lived experiences of the students it serves. In this capacity, Liu's story is not just a reflection on her individual achievements, but a trail blazed for prospective students with disabilities to build brighter futures for themselves through higher education.

Miramar College Receives \$2.5 Million for Veterans Resource Center

Miramar College was granted \$2.5 million dollars from California to upgrade resources for its Veteran and active duty military students and their dependents. The funding, spearheaded by Assemblymember Brian Maienschein, was part of Governor Gavin Newsom's 2022-2023 state budget. These funds provide enhanced services and infrastructure for the College's military community.

Miramar College used a majority of the funding to renovate and complete its long planned Veterans Resource Center, now located on the ground floor of the I-Building. The newly constructed facility expanded from its current 1,000 square foot space to 3,000 square feet. The expanded VRC is now equipped with new furniture, a private study and meeting rooms along with a student lounge. The College also built a computer lab.

Infrastructure enhancements include: LCD screens; projectors; laptop loaners; and internet upgrades. A Hy-flex technology room is planned for construction. In addition, Miramar College will provide an upgrade to its satellite teaching facility at Marine Corp Air Station Miramar (MCAS).

Expanded services include: additional peer mentoring; tutorial; admissions; orientation and mental health counseling services.

A portion of the funding will be used to provide emergency grant aid that will assist our heroes with basic needs.

"As a Veteran myself, I can't thank Assemblymember Maienschein enough for his attention to the needs of Veteran students, active duty military and their dependents," said Dr. Wesley Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "We are in the shadows of MCAS Miramar and Miramar College even has a location on the base to teach. We feel compelled to support these students the best way possible. However, we can't do it alone and now we have the resources to support these heroes."

Assembly Member Maienschein, who represents the 77th California Assembly District, presented Miramar College with a check for \$2.5 million at an October 12, 2022 celebration held on campus.

"California has the highest population of Veterans than any state, and a significant amount of those are here in San Diego," said Assemblymember Brian Maienschein. "Taking care of our Veterans is critical, which is why I am proud to have secured this funding to help enrich the educational experience and resources available to Veterans, active duty service members, and their families."

Fellow Assembly Member Kevin McCarty (7th California Assembly District) also attended the event. McCarty currently chairs Subcommittee #2 Education Finance Committee.

Each year San Diego Miramar College provides a comprehensive set of enrollment and student support services to approximately 2,000 Veterans, active duty military and their dependents through its Veteran Resource Center (VRC). The VRC supports the transition from military life to civilian life by providing all military affiliated students with support in accessing VA benefits and federal financial aid; enrolling in courses; accessing academic counseling and mental health services; and by providing dedicated academic support services such as tutoring, access to computers, and career development resource information. The VRC also provides military affiliated students with a dedicated space to meet and talk with peers who have had shared experiences.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Miramar College Awarded Developing Hispanic Serving Institution Grant

Miramar College joined its fellow San Diego Community College District institutions as a Hispanic Serving Institution grant recipient after SDCCD Board of Trustees approval to accept a \$2.7 million DHSI/STEM Éxito Project grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant allows the college to participate in the development of expanding programs and improving Latino/a and low income students' success outcomes, specifically in STEM fields.

"This is a very rewarding day in the history of Miramar College," said Dr. Wes Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "We have made becoming a Hispanic Serving Institution a priority at the College over the past few years. It takes a tremendous amount of work to meet the criteria but our dedicated folks made it happen for our institution and the Hispanic students we serve."

Miramar College will receive \$2,779,956 between October of 2022 and September of 2027 to better serve its growing Hispanic population.

The purpose of the U.S. Department of Education DHSI-Title V grant (STEM) is to assist Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) like San Diego Miramar College in expanding and improving Latino/a students' attainment of education goals and opportunities, particularly in STEM fields. These grants also enable HSIs to expand and enhance their academic offerings, program quality, and institutional stability on a broader base for Miramar College students.

Miramar will use grant funds to help ensure success and retention for low-income and Latino/a students, support equity-minded pedagogy, and strengthen institutional infrastructure to improve student outcomes.



STEM Éxito Project objectives include the following:

- Clarifying and enhancing a STEM Guided Pathway to Degree Completion
- Integration of Student Support Services and Academic Interventions specifically in STEM
- Improve Teaching and Student Success through faculty and staff professional development

The Title V DHSI grant earmarks funding for a 1.0 Program Activity Manager who will coordinate and administer grant programs and activities.

On May 31, Ivan V. Gutierrez started his tenure as DHSI/ STEM Program Director.

Miramar College Accepts Native American Student Success Program Funding

In June 2023, Miramar College accepted \$600,000 of funding from the Educational Services and Support Division of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office to support Native American students.

Serving the Native American student population is core to the California Community Colleges' mission. Assembly Bill 183, Article 11, allocates one-time funding to the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to establish a Native American Student Support and Success Program (NASSSP) for the purpose of developing local Native American student support and success programs and services.

The CCCCO identified San Diego Miramar College as one of twenty colleges within the State that were selected to receive NASSSP funding based on a set of selection criteria, which include: 1) the number of American Indian/Alaska Native (AIAN) population by district service area; 2) The average number of local CCC student head count who are AIAN over the past six academic years 3) Course success rates, in the past four academic years; 4) All cohort students who persisted from primary term of enrollment to subsequent primary term; 5) All cohort

students attained the Vision Goal completion definition within three years; 6) all cohort students who transferred to a four-year postsecondary institution with four years.

"Miramar College is excited to receive this very important funding for this underserved population," said Dr. Wesley Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "The College is continually striving to become more equitable and this will assist us and Native American students in reaching their educational goals."

The Native American Student Support and Success Program will assist with establishing the following:

- Strengthening K-12 pathways to and through the California Community Colleges for Native American students, including student transfer to the University of California and the California State University systems
- Ensuring the educational success of Native American students
- Developing Native American leaders
- Increasing the number of Native American mentors to empower future generations

Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Student Achievement Grant Awarded to Miramar College

Miramar College received a \$150,697 Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) student achievement program grant. The grant was awarded by the Educational Services and Support Division of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO). The San Diego Community College Board of Trustees approved acceptance of the grant at its June 15, 2023 board meeting.

"Assembly Bill 183 appropriates on-going funding for California Community Colleges to provide culturally responsive services to enhance student educational experiences and promote higher education success of low-income, underserved, and first generation Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) students and other underrepresented students under the Education Code," said Dr. Wesley Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "San Diego Miramar College will utilize the AANHPI grant funds to address multiple aspects of student needs with the goal of supporting educational success among AANHPI students."

The objectives of the AANHPI grant include the following:

- Culturally responsive learning communities
- Advising and counseling services
- Mental health counseling and awareness services
- Career development, career readiness, and employment services
- Supplemental instruction and tutoring
- Asian American, Pacific Islander studies courses and curriculum development
- Leadership development, internships, and mentorships



Miramar College Receives Rising Scholars Network Grant

In December 2022, the San Diego Community College Board of Trustees approved a \$382,500 Rising Scholars Network Grant to Miramar College from the Educational Services and Support Division of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to support incarcerated and formerly incarcerated students attain their educational goals. Serving this underrepresented demographic is core to the California Community Colleges' mission, critical to the CCCCO's DEIA Call to Action, and closely aligns with the Vision for Success goal to reduce equity gaps among traditionally underrepresented student groups.

The focus of the Rising Scholars Network Grant is to establish and support programs serving formerly incarcerated students enrolled in community college or to provide face-to-face instruction to community college students in prison or jail.

"The grant focuses on students' re-entry into their communities with the goal of seeing this underrepresented group succeed," said Dr. Wes Lundburg, president of Miramar College. "A major aspect of our efforts will be to offer an Associate of Science in Entrepreneurship degree program for students incarcerated at the Miramar Naval Consolidated Brig (MNCB)." The MNCB is a military prison and is unique in that it is one of only three naval consolidated brigs in the United States.

Another major aspect to Rising Scholars at Miramar College, in addition to academic instruction, will be to offer incarcerated students dedicated student support services by College staff and mentorship by industry experts. The second aspect of the program will be to support formerly incarcerated students on campus. For these students, Miramar College will offer application and financial aid assistance, a summer orientation program, one-on-one academic and counseling support, direct student aid, and access to a student club to promote community-building and networking. The program's wrap around services will be provided in a space that promotes collaboration, creativity, and supports mental health

Associate Professor of Sociology Laura Pecenco was selected to serve as the Faculty Coordinator for the Rising Scholars program. Laura began serving in this role at the start of the Spring 2023 semester and will continue through the Spring 2025 semester.

The terms of this agreement run from January 1, 2023 through July 31, 2025.



Miramar College Honored for Excellence in Equitable Course Placement

Miramar College was recognized by The Campaign for College Opportunity as one of only 56 California Community Colleges honored for implementing landmark placement policy AB 705, championed by Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin and signed into law in 2017. The College was one of three honorees in the category of Campus wide Transfer-Level English Success.

Prior to AB 705, the vast majority of incoming community college students were being placed into remedial math and English courses that ultimately discouraged and derailed students on their college journeys. Over a decade of research has shown that students' likelihood of earning a degree decreases when they start college in remedial courses.

Honorees:

Campuswide Transfer-Level English Success - California Community Colleges supporting students to complete transfer-level English within one year of initially enrolling in an English course.

M.E.S.A Grant Awarded to Miramar College

San Diego Miramar College has received a 5-year M.E.S.A. grant from the state Chancellor's Office totaling \$1.4 million for the creation of a Mathematics, Engineering, and Science Achievement program (MESA).

"The California Community College Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA) program is designed to help underserved and disproportionately impacted students majoring in the sciences achieve their goals, particularly in transfer-oriented programs," said Dr. Wesley P. Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "This is fantastic news, and a testament to our commitment to our students and our community!"

MESA programs are nationally recognized and operate collaboratively within statewide consortia to broaden participation and improve academic outcomes for underrepresented students in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education.


MESA USA has a vision where students of color are empowered to achieve their dreams in these fields to create prosperity in our communities. Miramar College will focus on infrastructure, design, and student outcomes, especially as it relates to comprehensive academic and student support. Professional development, internship opportunities, and workforce advisory board collaboration will also be a focus throughout the length of the grant.

San Diego Miramar College has been funded for five years for a total of \$1,400,000. The funding levels per year are:

- Year 1 (2022-23) \$280,000
- Year 2 (2023-24) \$280,000
- Year 3 (2024-25) \$280,000
- Year 4 (2025-26) \$280,000
- Year 5 (2026-27) \$280,000








Program Mapper Launched to Assist Students on a **Guided Pathway**

Degree **Completion**

In May 2023, Miramar College conferred 1,029 associate degrees. Included in that total is 476 students who will be graduating with an Associates Degree for Transfer (ADT), Another 525 certificates of achievement will be awarded.



Automotive Technology Program Has Accreditation Re-affirmed

The Miramar College Automotive Technology department has had its ASE Education Foundation accreditation extended through June of 2028.

To achieve this coveted recognition, the college's automotive technology program underwent rigorous evaluation by the ASE Education Foundation. Nationally accepted standards of excellence in areas such as instruction, facilities, and equipment were used.

ASE recently received the on-site evaluation results for the College's general automobile technician-training program and the results indicate that the program continues to meet the requirements for *Master Automobile Service Technology Accreditation*—the highest level of program accreditation recognized by the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE). ASE commended the Miramar College staff for maintaining program standards and continuing to meet the industry's requirements.

The Automotive Technology program at San Diego Miramar College provides both classroom theory and extensive hands on (shop) entry-level employment training as well as professional upgrading to persons in the automotive industry. The program provides training for each of the areas tested for National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) certification, and Bureau of Automotive Repair training for state licenses as well. Certificates of Achievement are offered in Automotive Chassis, Automotive Electrical, Automotive Engine Performance, and Automotive Transmissions. A Certificate of Performance is offered for Advanced Emissions Specialist.





Discover Series Makes Triumphant Return to Campus

More than 300 students from the San Diego Unified High School District descended on Miramar College during February for the return of Miramar College's popular *Discover Series*.

For the first time since 2019, Miramar College was able to host these popular outreach events now that the COVID-19 pandemic has become manageable.

The first event, *Discover Your Drive*, was held on February 9. The next was the *Discover Your Passion* event on February 13. These two events are designed to introduce current high school students to the Career Training Education classes offered at Miramar College. A total of 340 students were in attendance.

Discover Your Drive drew 215 high school students interested in three areas of study: Auto, Aviation and Diesel. Students received a hands on opportunity to meet with current faculty and take part in program demonstrations. All students went through a three-program rotation.

Baker Cook, a senior from Clairemont High School, volunteered to taxi an aircraft for take-off at Montgomery Field as part of the flight simulator demonstration offered by Aviation Faculty Member Josh Birnbaum.

"It's been really awesome," said Cook. "I decided to come today to try to understand what jobs are available and what I might get paid during my career doing these types of jobs."

Josh Birnbaum teaches Aviation 101 Private Pilot Ground School and its concurrent lab, which features 12 flight training devices. "I saw a lot of great reaction from the students that came through here," said Birnbaum. "It's something I wish I got when I was in high school. I am a trying to be the poster child of this program. I started in this program, and in the same class I am currently teaching. I just fell in love with this program and flying, so much that I left my career at Apple after 12 years to pursue teaching here at Miramar." Birnbaum continued, "I'm not saying I regret my previous career choice, but if I had started this sooner how much more enjoyment would I have had in life?"







Auto students were able to get under the chassis of more than a half dozen cars, while diesel students took turns operating a backhoe provided by Hawthorne-Cat. Penske brought in two trucks for inspection, one gas powered and the other electric powered. Solar Turbine tabled at the event and representatives from the Alaska Airlines talent acquisitions team was present to meet with students.

"We're very excited to bring this series of events back after the pandemic," said Claudia Estrada-Howell, associate dean for Career Education at San Diego Miramar College. "The intent of the Miramar College *Discover Series* event(s) is to strengthen the College's K-14 CTE pathways by exposing students to the college's Career Training Education."

Miramar College also hosted *Discover Your Passion* on February 13. This event was focused on the College's Business & Entrepreneurship, Paralegal and Child Development programs. One-hundred and twenty-five students attended the Monday event.

Discover Your Passion attendees visited the Regional Entrepreneurship Center (REC) Innovation Lab and were shown how to start a new business

and concluded by participating in a pitch presentation to their classmates. At the Child Development Center, the students learned through play at 4 different stations that included painting, manipulatives, and much more. Paralegal showed the students how to identify legal issues simply by reviewing childhood stories, such as 3 Little Pigs and Sleeping Beauty. Business shared with students strategies on how to construct a sales message while Finance played a game called Financial Football, in honor of the recent Super Bowl.

Students were provided lunch, a swag bag and were able to win prizes during both events.


Dr. Allison Douglas-Chicoye Named Dean of Student Development

Legendary Volleyball Coach
John Landicho Retires

Miramar College volleyball head coach John Landicho, the only coach the men's program has had since its inception in 2015, announced his retirement from coaching at the end of the 2023 season.

A veteran of 31 years in the sport, Landicho was hired by Miramar College in the spring of 2014 to develop men's and women's volleyball programs for the College. Men's volleyball competed for the first time in 2015, with women's indoor volleyball following in 2018 and the accompanying women's beach program the spring of 2023.

In its first nine years of existence, the Jets men's volleyball program produced four PCAC championships and five state Top 10 rankings, while placing 16 student-athletes into four-year university MVB programs. Landicho was honored as the 2017, 2018, 2022, and 2023 Pacific Coast Athletic Conference men's volleyball Coach of

the Year. He also served as women's indoor volleyball head coach in 2022, guiding the program through its first post-COVID season. Throughout his tenure at Miramar College, Landicho has been instrumental in the development of all three programs, as well as Miramar's new four-court sand volleyball court complex.

"For 30+ years I've tried to develop dynamic young men and women through champion-ship-level volleyball," says Landicho. "While those seasons didn't all produce championships, it did produce better human beings, and there can be no better outcome from intercollegiate and interscholastic athletics. That I've been able to experience a ridiculous amount of winning is also a byproduct of our program, and is a testament to our players understanding, embracing, and flourishing in our process."

Landicho will continue to remain active in the sport of men's volleyball as the president of the California Community College Men's Volleyball Coaches Association (CCCMVCA), where he will continue to provide leadership to the sport while advancing initiatives to grow the sport in the California JC system.

Landicho remains a professor in the Dept. of Exercise Science, Health & Nutrition at Miramar, a position he'll continue in through December of 2023.


Ernie Reyes was introduced as the new head women's soccer coach on December 20, 2022.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Edward Borek

"Community isn't just something you find, virtually or otherwise," penned San Diego Miramar College alumnus Edward Borek in his 2021 short story titled To Find Community. "And that's because, to find community, you have to build community." And, that is exactly what Borek set out to do during his time as a Jet and still does to this day.

When he enrolled at Miramar College in fall 2020, isolation resulting from the pandemic was very evident in his life. Borek, who had been laid off from his job that summer and was living alone, said that he was desperate to find some sort of community.

"Everyone was feeling the pangs of pandemic loneliness," he said. And, knowing school was continuing on virtually, he decided to reach out to every Miramar College club he could. That is when he met Laura Gonzalez, a professor and the faculty advisor for the college's Club Spectrum, a LGBTQ+ student organization, who invited him to a club meet and greet event online.

While the first meeting had many attendees, subsequent encounters became just he and another student. So, Borek, who identifies as a bisexual, cisgender male, took it upon himself to help build up the community by promoting the group during other club and student government meetings and creating a website for Club Spectrum.

Eventually he went on to become the club's president, as well as the college's Associated Student Government president and a student representative on the District's Board of Trustees, as well as for the LGBTQ+ Alliance, a student and employee advocacy committee. It was in these positions where Borek was able to further advocate for the LGBTQ+ community including an added amendment in the ASG constitution to recognize preferred pronouns and increased the availability of gender-neutral bathrooms — of which there are now five at Miramar College and more than 30 districtwide.

"A lot of work had been laid out before me," he said. "Bringing Club Spectrum, as well as the LGBTQ+ Alliance and the District Queer Alliance into the fold — recognizing them as important stakeholders was important to me."

By the time Borek graduated with his associate degree in business administration in spring 2022, Club Spectrum was having regular, well-attended events including virtual game nights, providing volunteer opportunities at campus food distributions, and participating in community events like the San Diego AIDS Walk and Pride Parade (the latter of which the District and Board of Trustees has participated in since 2015).

Borek isn't the only one advocating on behalf of the LGBTQ+ community to make sure the District has available safe, welcoming spaces for what he terms a "minoritized" population.

In 2017, Gonzalez, who introduced Borek to Club Spectrum, developed a Safe Zone training program for Miramar College. Today, she and District Research and Planning Analyst and Mesa College alumna Jaime Sykes Seiverd together educate faculty, administrators, and classified professionals with a program that provides knowledge about LGBTQ+language, tools to increase inclusivity in the classroom and in the workplace, and ideas to build a more sensitive environment. While each SDCCD college has its own Safe Zone training process, Gonzalez and Sykes are working toward standardizing a districtwide program.

"We want to create an environment in which everyone can be their authentic selves with dignity and respect," Gonzalez said. "We want to provide not only education but also practical things that people can do to support the community in their workplace."


At Miramar College, a list of those who have been Safe Zone trained and consent to having their names listed — approximately 120 to-date — is published on the college's LGBTQ+ Resources page. Similarly, at San Diego Mesa College, the Ally/Out List is available as a resource noting those faculty, staff, and administrators who identify themselves as members of the LGBTQ+ community or allies who proudly serve as advocates for respect, inclusivity, and acceptance.

"While I think there is a lot that needs to happen beyond Safe Zone trainings to ensure LGBTQ+ students feel included, supported, and valued for who they are, I think the Safe Zone program is a positive step forward," Sykes Seiverd said. "It provides committed college employees with the ability to better support their students, knowledge of how to move forward when they make a mistake, and how to see and accept students for who they are and not who they are assumed to be."

The Westview High School graduate hopes to attend medical school and become a physician with a specialization in gynecology/fertility.

Shafir was the president of Miramar College's chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. She also served as the vice president of the Biology Club.

Students are nominated for the academic team by their college administrators. Selection is based on academic achievement, leadership, and engagement in college and community service. Coca-Cola Academic Team members were recognized in both local and statewide ceremonies and were also be recognized internationally during Phi Theta Kappa's annual convention, PTK Catalyst, held in Columbus, Ohio, April 2020-2022.

Two Named Cooke Undergraduate Scholarship Semifinalists

Two Miramar College students were named semifinalists for the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship Award. Calvin Hill and Michael Raska were among 459 semifinalists named across the United States of America. In 2023, the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation received 1,700 applications from students that attend 215 community colleges in 38 states.

Calvin Hill is a 2021 graduate of Del Norte High school and a second year student studying Economics at Miramar College. Hill is part of the San Diego Community College's Pathway Program and was accepted to UC San Diego where he will study Economics. Hill is also completed an Associates Degree for Transfer, and with it, acceptance into San Diego State University. The first generation college student is the oldest of three children born to a single mother. Hill describes himself as a role model to his two younger twin siblings. "I wanted to show my siblings that they can do anything in education," said Hill, who recently paused his work career to finish his studies and the results were straight A's.

Michael Raska graduated from Miramar College in May 2022. Raska received his Associates Degree for Transfer in History. While at Miramar College, he achieved a 3.9 grade point average. He has been accepted to San Diego State University where he will pursue a bachelor's degree in Military History starting in the fall of 2023. Raska calls himself, "a real life Jimmy the Jet" after serving in the United States Navy as an aviation structural hydraulics mechanic and plane captain airman in Strike Fighter Squadron 22. He routinely helped launch air strikes off the deck of the USS Carl Vinson on terrorist targets in Syria and Iraq from 2013-2015. He trained for combat at the Navy's Top Gun Flight School.

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation awards community college students who have demonstrated exceptional academic ability, leadership, service, and a determination to complete their bachelor's degrees at top four-year institutions.

The Cooke Transfer Scholarship is designed to create a clear pathway to a four-year degree by offering up to \$55,000 per year along with academic advising and access to a network of peers.

Jack LeDuff Named PCAC Male Student-Athlete of the Year


Jets men's volleyball student-athlete Jack LeDuff was named the 2023 PCAC Male Scholar Athlete of the Year in the PCAC!

That dedication

has paid off, as Jack has committed to Cal Lutheran University to continue his volleyball and academic career—the 18th player the Miramar MVB program has helped to a four-year university's MVB program in eight years.




Good-Byes

Miramar College Business Professor Aims to Make Cents

After two decades of working in finance, management, and marketing, David Wilhelm made the bold move to turn to teaching. Wilhelm, who has taught business courses at San Diego Miramar College for eight years now, said he decided to make the career transition because he wanted to educate others about finance and finding success in their business careers.

Since joining Miramar College, he has done more than educate students. He played a large role in achieving the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs for the college — making it the only nationally accredited two-year business program in the region.

In addition to teaching, Wilhelm regularly contributes to WalletHub, a website that offers educational information about personal credit, and serves as a financial expert to other outlets. The biggest financial advice he has for everyone?

"Set a specific goal, spend less, and save, save, save!"

Wilhelm spoke to the San Diego Community Colleges' With Excellence (WE) magazine about what drives him, his curriculum, and what kind of legacy he hopes to leave at Miramar College.

What makes your classes stand apart from other typical business classes? What kind of lessons do you try to incorporate in your curriculum?

My broad industry experience in functional areas of marketing and finance complements my academic background because the knowledge gained has guided



and shaped curriculum improvements, which help students understand how concepts introduced in the classroom apply in practice.

One approach, which has been tremendously successful with students over the years, is to discuss current events in business and how they relate to the concepts introduced in the course. A student pairs with another student in class to review and discuss the topic and how the current event relates to the concepts introduced in the class.

What is the best day you have had as a business professor at Miramar College?

The best day for me is every day when I first walk into the classroom and see 40 eager students who represent the future as business professionals in our community. It is a privilege for me to be able to influence and encourage them to achieve their full potential in life, which makes it my best day.

Of course, your job is to teach students. But, sometimes professors can learn a thing or two from their students. What have your students taught you over the years?

Several students literally teach me how to use new generations of technology. I am from the Baby Boomer generation and many of us resisted technology until forced to use it. They also remind me how similar they are in the challenges faced in daily life, and the need to



be flexible and adapt to change that is often beyond one's control, such as the effects of the pandemic.

Have any past students reached out to you to tell you about the success they've found in the business world thanks to what they've learned from you?

I hear from several former students on a regular basis — many of whom are enrolled in graduate school or working as a professional in an organization with tremendous potential for future success. One former student, who graduated from SDSU with a degree in finance, is currently working for Vanguard Investments as a financial manager and has been promoted twice in the firm. I feel so fortunate to have known and worked with many of these very bright and talented individuals while they attended Miramar College.

When you retire someday as a business professor, what do you hope your students will say about you?

I hope they say that I was someone who motivated them to achieve their full potential and made a valuable contribution in their life!

David Castañeda

David Castañeda, Music Professor

Born in Oakland, and raised in the San Francisco Bay Area, David Castañeda is a multi-percussionist, composer, arranger, podcaster and educator. While completing his undergraduate degree at UCSD, David studied and collaborated with faculty such as Kamou Kenyatta, David Borgo, and Mark Dresser. After graduating with honors from UCSD, he was accepted into the Afro-Latin Master's of Music program at California State University, Los Angeles. David studied arrangement under Dr. Paul DeCastro, and Afro-Latin percussion performance under Grammy Award-winning drummer Euro Zambrano and renowned Cuban percussionist Calixto Oviedo. His M.M. thesis consisted of systemic and historical analysis of the development of salsa, beginning with the Cuban changuí in the late nineteenth century and culminating in the solidification of a distinct aesthetic in the mid-1970s among Caribbean youth in New York City. Upon graduating from CSULA, he was accepted into the M.A./ Ph.D. program at the University of California, Los Angeles. Working closely with Dr. Steven Loza, David made topics pertaining to globalization and intercultural dynamics the focus of his research. David focused his doctoral studies on intercultural dynamics, completing a dissertation that explored the lives and careers of six internationally acclaimed musicians from across the United States and Latin America: Joyce Moreno, Ed Motta, Dayme Arocena, Miguel Zenón, Etienne Charles, and Lupita Infante. The project utilized an approach steeped in ethnography, and relied on polyculturalism as its primary framework. Outside of his studies, David continues to perform as a percussionist and artist. David leads his own sextet, which features his arrangements and composition influenced by North American, Brazilian and Latin American music. He also leads a six-piece salsa band, Kini Kini, catering to the San Diego Latin dance community. David focuses his academic training into a podcast named the People + Art Podcast. Serving as host, David speaks with artists locally and abroad, exploring and appreciating their work through an ethnographic lens.




Pecenco Named Rising Scholars Faculty Coordinator



Lain Wins Faculty Scholarship

Miramar College Biology Professor Ashlee Lain was chosen to receive the Suanne Davis Roueche Faculty Scholarship to attend the NISOD's International Conference on Teaching and Leadership Excellence. The conference took place May 27-30 in Austin, TX.



Dr. Stefanie Shipman Nominated for the William P. Foster Dissertation of the Year Award

Dr. Stefanie Johnson Shipman, associate professor of English/ELAC, was nominated for the William P. Foster Dissertation of the Year Award from the Department of Leadership Studies at the University of San Diego. Her dissertation is titled, "Questioning and Disrupting Narratives of Motherhood and Leadership: The Experiences of Deans, Presidents, and Other California Community College Mother-Leaders." Stefanie completed her dissertation while on a sabbatical in Fall 2022.

In her dissertation research, which was grounded in matricentric feminism and community college leadership theory, Stefanie applied a matrifocal approach. She conducted sixteen interviews of women who identify as both mothers and community college leaders across the state of California, including several deans, vice presidents, presidents, and a vice chancellor from both instructional and student services divisions. Her thematic analysis revealed the ways that participants experience dominant narratives related to mothering (e.g., the perfect mother construct, patriarchal motherhood, and intensive motherhood) and community college leadership (e.g., gender and leadership, the ideal worker assumption, hierarchy-based leadership). Although participants reported experiences with dominant narratives that can dictate mothering and leadership and lead to pressures, the mother-leaders were active in resisting these narratives through a complex meaning-making process. Stefanie's dissertation illuminates counternarratives that demonstrate a move from prescriptive motherhood expectations to empowered mothering and a shift from traditional conceptions of leadership to more people-centered wholehearted approaches.



Rod Porter, Exercise Science Professor

Porter Headed to England

Rod Porter, Exercise Science professor, is off to Manchester, U.K. for the HYROX age-group World Championships after placing in a spring 2023 regional qualifier in Los Angeles! He will be competing against the top athletes in his age group from all over the world.

HYROX is the original fitness race that consists of eight workout stations (1,000 meter skierg, 450lb sled push, 330lb sled pull, 80 meter burpee broad jump, 1,000M row, 200 meter farmer carry with 140lbs, 100 meter lunge with 70lbs, & 100 wall balls with 20lbs) all with a 1,000 kilometer run between each station for 5+ miles total or running with top finisher times between 70 to 90 minutes.

This is his second year qualifying for both the HYROX World Championships and the DEKA World Championships which will be held in December in Texas.

PATH is funded by a 3-year grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, which benefits both UC San Diego Ph.D. Arts and Humanities students and SDCCD transfer students. The PATH Integrated Fellowship Initiative develops leaders in teaching, administration, and mentoring to introduce fellows to a wide range of academic teaching and leadership positions within the community college system. Additionally, for no-cost, PATH guides SDCCD transfer students from City, Mesa, and Miramar Colleges into Arts and Humanities majors at UC San Diego. Students receive transfer guidance, weekly meetings with a mentor, and academic and professional development opportunities.

"Studying the humanities is just as important and meaningful as Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math," said Paulson. "There is a significant divide in this country, pursuing the humanities allows for a deeper more holistic view. Humanities affect how we behave, how we vote, and how we understand the world."

At Miramar College, Assistant Professor Paulson is developing her students as critical thinkers as they themselves become PATH applicants. She teaches English 101 from a global perspective, students learn about the relationship between the United States toward other countries through literature, and in her English 205 course, students focus on rhetorical analysis in social political movements such as the advocacy of Civil Rights, Farm Workers, Chicanos, Me Too, and Black Lives Matter.

Paulson started working in academia as a Corps Member for Teach for America, teaching elementary children on the islands of Hawaii. Prior to her arrival at Miramar College, Paulson worked as a Ph.D. Fellow at the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, as an English Teacher at Cal Coast Academy, as a Graduate Student Instructor at UC San Diego, as well as a world traveler, taking a gap year backpacking through Australia, New Zealand, Thailand, India, and Europe.

Paulson holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and Gender and Women's studies from the University of California, Berkeley, and a Master of Arts in Literature from UC San Diego.

Administrative Services Highlights for 2022-23

Administrative Services Reorganization

Administrative services was reorganized in 2023 to provide enhanced service to the college community and students. This reorganization changed Administrative Services from a horizontal organizational structure with only one manager, the Vice President of Administrative Services, to a vertical structure with three new directors and operating units. Under the leadership of the Vice President of Administrative Services these three new operating units have structures that allow for succession from classified to supervisor, manager/director, and vice president. The departments of Budget, Purchasing, Travel, Employment, Payroll, and Student Accounting have been combined under the leadership of the newly established Director of Administrative Services. The departments of Reprographics, Mailroom, Switchboard, Stockroom, Hourglass Support Services, Civic Center, Facilities and Occupational Health and Safety have been combined under the leadership of the newly established Director of College Facilities and Operations. The most significant change to our operations was the addition of College Technology. The departments of Instructional Computing. Administrative Computing, Audio Visual,

and Web Services were moved from the school of Planning, Research, Institutional Effectiveness, Library, and Technology to Administrative Services under the leadership of the newly established Director of College Technology.

Improved Wi-Fi in Automotive Complex

While the college is planning for a collegewide upgrade of IT infrastructure to support Wi-Fi it became clear that there were significant gaps in service within the Automotive classroom buildings. These gaps in coverage were significantly impacting teaching, learning, and success. Through collaboration with District IT, campus resources were identified to immediately upgrade several classrooms and labs that had weak to no Wi-Fi coverage.

College-wide PC Upgrade

Miramar has a long-standing process that utilizes Physical Plant and Instructional Support (PPIS) funding to purchase new classroom computers. The replaced computers often meet current standards for administrative computers. When appropriate, these computers are rolleddown to faculty and administrative workstations. These PPIS resources typically range from \$50,000-\$500,000. Over the past two years, Miramar has received significant increases to this restricted one-time funding source. This opportunity allowed Miramar to purchase and replace over 700 classroom/ lab desktop computers and over 260 lab

laptops. Roll down desktop computers with Windows 10 operating systems, 8GB RAM, and SSD hard drives were re-deployed to faculty and administrative workstations bringing current most administrative workstations on campus.

Personnel Additions

With the collaboration and support of Chancellor's Cabinet, Miramar has made progress in adding permanent contract personnel. In the 2022-23 fiscal year, Miramar added:

Veterans Center and Honors

In 2021-22 Miramar built and established its first Veteran's Resource Center. Subsequent to its completion, Miramar received additional \$2.5M to expand the facility and services. In collaboration with District Facilities

DIVISIONAL REPORTS

Management, Miramar has engaged the services of the architectural firm Steinberg Hart to renovate the I-building to expand the Veteran's Center. This expansion will also benefit and relocate the Honors Center and will improve building flooring and restrooms.

Instructional Services Highlights for 2022-2023

The 2022-2023 academic year was a transformational year for Instructional Services and Miramar's Vision as a "Student-Ready College." At the core of Instructional Services is the Student's Journey, meeting them where they are and for who they are, while simultaneously facilitating retention, persistence, and success/completion.

Through several grants, action plans were developed, and implementation started to address the needs of our students whether they are a first-year, traditional, adult learner, disproportionately impacted, career-tech ed, transfer, STEM, or "undecided" student. This year, Miramar College was awarded the following, additional grants:

- Designated Hispanic Serving Institution (DHSI; \$2.8 million over five years)
- Math, Engineering, Science Achievement (MESA; \$1.4 million over five years)

- Culturally Responsive Pedagogy and Practices Grant (\$300K)
- Zero Textbook Costs (\$20K)

With continued work using the Guided Pathways framework, and interweaving the college's Equity Plan into institutional planning, Instructional Services has also made good progress with strategic enrollment management and success teams for students. Academic Year 2023-2024 is destined to be a year in which the scaffolding started for students to persist and be successful can be strengthened. Towards this end, each of the Instructional Schools have highlights of their own as follows:

School of Math, Biological, Exercise and Physical Sciences

Student Services Division 2022-2023 Highlights

The Miramar College Student Services Division focused this year's efforts on the re-engagement of students as our staff were making a full return campus. We did this through increased outreach activities, expanded availability of on-campus services, development of new funding sources, and an overall restructuring of the Students Services Division to support the College's efforts with enrollment management.

Increased Outreach Activities

Across the Division, each department participated in College wide efforts to increase outreach across campus and into the community. Some examples include: the return of an in-person Super Saturday event (an open house event for prospective students), in-person high school visits and community events, revamped webpages to ease user navigation, and the increased use of workshops, text messaging, social media, and on-line chat tools to share information.

Some selected activities and outcomes shared by the team include:

Financial Aid Office

- Manned an information booth during the Mira Mesa Tet Festival which resulted in over 800 community contacts during the event
- Revamped College's Financial Aid webpage to improve navigation and accessibility
- Established Instagram and Linktree accounts to keep students informed of important information/events coming up

- Followers rose to 259 (+12.1%)
- Reached 584 accounts (+141%)
- Engaged 51 accounts (+96.1%)
- Profile visits increased to 93 (+12%)
- Utilized Ocelot texting software for information campaigns and launched "Fuel Your Finance" newsletter to communicate with faculty, staff, and students

Basic Needs Office

- Increased CALFresh Outreach activities on campus
 - **CALFresh Outreach Coordinator** participated in a variety of campus events and hosted informational workshops

Mental Health Office

- Conducted 40 workshops and presentations which provided information and activities to help students manage stress. (As of April 2023, this touched 491 participants)
- Provided free access to "Headspace" in March 2023, a mindfulness and meditation app, to support students in decreasing stress, increasing focus and improving sleep
- Disseminated information and resources to the campus community about various topics including: Suicide Awareness and Prevention Month; Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month; Domestic Violence Awareness Month; Black History Month; Women's History Month; Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month; and Mental Health Awareness Month
- Initiated an Instagram account to increase outreach and marketing efforts
- Developed a Mental Health video in collaboration with the Guided Pathways initiative to increase student awareness of available services

NEXTUp (Foster Youth program under EOPS)

Expanded Availability of Services

Along with increased outreach activities, the Student Services Division worked to increase the level of in-person services available on campus, while still offering the availability of on-line services.

 Implemented a new Award Management software to allow students to apply for scholarships electronically. As a result, 1290 scholarships were submitted in 2023 compared to 342 in 2022. A total of \$183,000 in scholarships were awarded this year

Dreamers Office

- Formalized a partnership with the Higher Education Legal Services (HELS) to provide FREE immigration-related legal services to students and employees. Appointments were offered on-campus
- Established partnership with Dreams for Change to provided FREE tax-related services to undocumented students
- Offered 29 informational workshops that were attended by 436 individuals—a 33% increase over last year
- Served 86 individuals during one-onone appointments—a 13% increase over last year

Admissions Office

 - Enrolled 3,754 students in Administration of Justice (ADJU) In-Service courses
 - Enrolled 25 International Students (up from 16 for 2021-2022)
 - Enrolled 2,969 CCAP students
 - Enrolled 711 students into Learning Community courses
 - Enrolled 1,385 students in Instructional Service Agreement (ISA) courses
 - Processed 284 Honors Contracts

Veterans Office

- Opened a new Veterans Resource Center (VRC) in Fall 2022
- Certified enrollment for 920 VA students (up from 885 for 2021-2022)
- Hosted several in-person events and activities, such as New Student Veterans Orientation, Final Stretch, Career Possibili-Teas, and a Spring Social

Basic Needs Office

- Expanded services to include: clothing closet, hygiene support, technology assistance, transportation support, housing navigation, internal and community resource referral, and emergency funding
- Distributed 62,500 pounds of food
 - 42,000 distributed via the Jet Fuel Pantry in partnership with the Retail Rescue Program
 - 20,500 distributed via the Really, Really Free Farmers Market in partnership with Feeding San Diego

 Approximately 6,820 student contacts were logged via the Jet Fuel Resource Center (5,630 visits) and the Really, Really Free Farmers Market (1,190 visits)

DSPS Office

- Conducted 27 High Tech Center trainings for students. Topics included Otter, Intro to the High-Tech Center, Zoom, Canvas, and the MySDCCD portal
- Instituted an in-person drop-in counseling pilot program
- In 2021-2022 DSPS served 691 students. This was a 9% increase over 2020-2021

Student Health Services

- Coordinated the distribution of over the counter free At-Home COVID Tests. This year the staff distributed over 3,400 test kits to faculty, staff and students
- Approximately 1,600 office visits were recorded in the 2022-2023 academic year
- The Office administered 540 immunizations, including 200 COVID-19 vaccinations
- Health Services provided support, home care plans and return to class notifications for 150 students who tested positive for COVD-19

Mental Health

- Mental Health offered a hybrid format of in-person and remote counseling and group services to students to include student appointments, Mental Health drop-in hours, Thoughtful Tuesday (mindfulness activities), and various support groups
- The following in-person and remote counseling appointments occurred:
 - Fall 2022- 217 appointments for 78 individual students
 - Spring 2023 (as of 4/20)—189 appointments for 71 individual students

- Conducted 40 workshops/presentations/ events which provided information and activities to manage stress to over 491 participants (as of 4/20)
- Rolled out free access to Headspace app in March 2023, a mindfulness and meditation app created to support decreased stress, increased focus and improved sleep to support students' academic success

Student Life and Leadership

- Supported ten students to attend the California Community College Student Affairs Student Leadership Conference in October 2022
- Coordinated the certification process of 18 clubs, which is near the College's all-time high prior to COVID
- Held numerous voter registration drives and get out the vote events in fall 2022 and completed and submitted Civic and Voter Empowerment Action Plan
- Attended the SSCCC General Assembly in Long Beach with six Associated Student Government members
- Assisted in the design and coordinated the planning and building of the float representing the SDCCD in the Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade on January 15, 2023.
 The float won second prize in the Education category
- Designed and facilitated a six-part Leadership Workshop series attended by 54 students as of April 13th
- Held a variety of Re-Engagement Events
 - Fall 17 re-engagement events attended by 1,210 students
 - Spring 30 re-engagement events attended by 447 students (as of April 10)
- Supported the campus community in the establishment of College Hour. Participation for these events is as follows:
 - Fall Semester: 294 events attended by 4.846 individuals

- 19 Student Services departments and programs and all ACPs participated
- 12 Student organizations participated, holding 73 meetings with 530 participants
- Events were held 69% in-person, 28% virtually, 2% hybrid, and 1% were held off-campus
- Spring Semester (as of April 15): 201 events attended by 1,738 individuals
 - 21 Student Services departments and programs and all ACPs participated
 - Events were held 70% in-person, 27% virtually, 2% hybrid, and 1% were held off-campus

Growth in Special Population Programs

- NextUp (Foster Youth program under EOPS): 66% growth in number of foster youth served compared to the prior year, reaching an all-time high of 25 NextUp foster youth
- EOPS Foster Youth: 22% grown in non-NextUp foster youth served compared to prior year, for a total of 36 foster youth served this year
- CARE: 59% growth in single parents served reaching 27 students, an all-time high in the last ten years
- CalWORKs: 17% growth in CalWORKs students compared to prior year – 48 students served

New Funding Sources

In an effort to support students in new ways, the SS Division has been active in pursuing new resources being made available at the State and Federal level. The majority of these new funds required staff to develop and submit grant proposals and/or develop detailed program plans that would meet program requirements.

Some examples of new funding awarded include:

Financial Aid Office

- Learning Alignment Employer Program (LAEP): this program offers state work-study funds to community college students and required us to develop new processes and infrastructure to issue awards. The program required that at least 1 student be enrolled by the Spring 2023 semester, but we were able to enroll 4 total students
- Golden State Education & Training Grant Program (GSETGP): this program provided resources to students who lost their job due to the pandemic. As of April 2023, we have been able to award 66 students a grant of \$2,500 to utilize in reskilling, upskilling, and accessing educational/training programs to get back into the workforce

Veterans Services Office

 Received a \$2.5 million in state funding through the support of Assemblymember Brian Maienschein to upgrade resources for the veteran and active duty military students and their dependents. Expanded services include: expanded peer mentoring, tutorial, admissions, orientation and mental health counseling services. A portion of the funding will also be used to provide emergency grant aid that will assist veteran students with basic needs. In addition, the funds will support upgrades to the teaching facility at Marine Corp air Station Miramar (MCAS)

Student Affairs Office

- Rising Scholars: a multi-year grant to support formerly incarcerated students enrolled in community colleges and provides face-to-face instruction to community college students at the MCAS brig
 - Rising Scholars in conjunction with "The Access Project", a non-profit legal services organization, hosted Clean Slate Clinic. Students who

attended were provided with assistance to complete the forms necessary to petition to the Court to expunge their records

- Established a support program for LGBTQIA+ students and employees
 - Hired Project Assistant to assist development of engagement programming and administration of Safe Zone training
 - Offered 3 workshops that were attended by 45 individuals:
 - Equitable Employment hiring event featuring 8 local LGBT-friendly companies
 - Drag Queen Story Hour
 - Navigating Safe Spaces & Family with Mental Health Counseling
 - 28 individuals have signed up to receive ongoing updates
- Native American Student Support Services Grant: a five year grant for \$1.5 million dollars to develop services and activities to support Native American students and Alaskan Natives
- Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander Student Achievement Program (AANHPI SAP): a new program to support colleges in providing educational experiences to promote success for lowincome, underserved, and first-generation AANHPI students

Restructuring of Student Services Division

In an effort to better support enrollment management efforts across campus, the Student Services Division realigned its organizational structure to create a new Enrollment Services area. This re-structuring pulled together Outreach, Admissions & Records, and Financial Aid under a newly

created dean position. Previously each of these three offices reported to three separate managers. We expect that this new structure will allow for increased collaboration between these three offices and the campus as a whole and also streamline the process by which students enroll at Miramar. Below are key staff hires that are supporting the growth of the Student Services Division:

Scholarship Awards Ceremony

Miramar College awarded deserving students just over \$183,000 at its 29th annual scholarship awards ceremony held on campus April 12. Miramar College students, their guests and families, along with the College's classified professional staff and faculty, San Diego Community College District officials and community partners gathered in L-105 to watch the celebration.

This academic year, the Miramar College Foundation administered 66 scholarships to 192 recipients totaling \$183,594.

The Miramar College Foundation itself presented 40 scholarship awards totaling \$114,612 up from last year's \$77,750 awarded. Another 26 awards, totaling \$68,982, were given by external donors.

The Miramar College Foundation, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation, was officially created on August 21, 1994 and is committed to supporting the diverse population of Miramar College students by raising scholarship funds.

The annual Scholarship Awards Ceremony is organized by the College's Financial Aid and Scholarship Office.

The San Diego Miramar College Foundation received a \$10,000.00 grant from San Diego Gas & Electric for its Vets-2-Jets program.

Miramar College created the Vets-2-Jets program to remove the financial barriers that negatively impact the academic success of disabled Veterans. Through the career placement center, the program is able to assist Veterans, who have a 20% or greater VA disability rating, with textbook assistance, laptops for loan, scholarships, and at times, provide emergency grants that help with utility bills, housing and transportation needs. The funds are also used to sponsor on-campus activities student engagement activities for all Veterans. To date, the Vets-2-Jets program has purchased textbooks for over 200 Veterans.

With its close proximity to MCAS Miramar, San Diego Miramar College served the needs of 2,527 students who declared as active duty military, veteran or military dependent during the 2022-2023 academic year.

Cam Barry Named CCCAA Scholar Athlete

Recently graduated Miramar College men's basketball player Cameron Barry has been selected as one of just two 2023 California Community College Athletic Association Scholar-Athletes. This honor is the highest bestowed on the more than 24,000 annual participants in the CCCAA. Barry will receive a \$1,000 scholarship and a watch commemorating his accomplishment.

In May of 2022, Barry was named the 2022 Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) Student Athlete of the Year. Barry achieved a 4.0 grade point average and completed 80 units over 3 years at Miramar College. What sets Cameron apart from all the others was his completion of a bachelor's degree the same year he completed an associate degree. Barry, alone, completed 30 units during the spring 2022 semester all while being named PCAC "Player of the Week" 6 times.

Barry received a bachelor's degree from San Diego State in Business Finance. His AA degree from Miramar College was in Business. While attending two different universities at the same time, Barry managed to also carry a 3.87 GPA over the course of his San Diego State studies.

How did he do it?

"It was all about time management," said Barry. "At San Diego State they allow you to take up to four leaves of absences, so I strategically took two of them during my Miramar basketball seasons. That is how I stayed on track. I took half my units there (SDSU) and the rest here (Miramar College) and they transferred right over."

Barry also dazzled on the court where the Jets point guard was a two-time All-Pacific Coast Athletic Conference First Team selection. He left Miramar College as the school's second all-time leading scorer, the career three-point leader, and holding the record for most three-pointers in a game with eleven.

"Cam is such a special kid," said Nick Gehler, athletic director and head men's basketball coach at San Diego Miramar College. "His dedication to both his academics and athletics truly sets him apart from anyone I have ever coached."

Barry will be honored at the 2023 CCCAA Celebration of Scholar Athlete's luncheon on Wednesday, March 29 in Sacramento.

Barry played NCAA basketball for Cal-State Dominguez Hills during the 2022-2023 season where was the Toros second leading scorer at 12.7 points per game.
