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




Most students were employed



Type of Employment




Most work was not related to their field of study






Primary Education Goal



How did attending Miramar College impact graduates?




How has Miramar contributed to student knowledge, skills, and personal development?



Broader education, independent learning, and analytical thinking were the highest rated skills in development.













Usage of the career center, transfer center, and registration office has declined from the previous year.








Mental health services and food pantry use peaked in 2020.






Student Barriers


Previously, issues with class difficulty and work were among the top 5 barriers.

Are graduate students currently employed?




Most graduates reported being employed after graduating from Miramar College. Full-time employment dropped in 2020, but has now surpassed previous levels.

Employed graduates (full- and part-time) plan to...




Most employed graduated students plan to stay with their current job, while a small amount plan to seek new employment either full-time or part-time. In 2022, 10% indicated they plan to quit working.



Employment plans in the next six months


Unemployed graduates plan to...



Most unemployed graduated students plan to seek employment either full-time or part-time. In 2022, 22% of students plan to continue their education while remaining unemployed.




Education plans in the next six months

Which of the following supports and services would be helpful to you as a graduate of Miramar College?




Between 2019 and 2022, graduates would found career-related activities and alumni networking the most helpful.

How did COVID affect students?


The effect of COVID on educational plans

- The most common impact was on mental health (56%).
- 38% of students reported that COVID caused them to take longer to complete their education.



Resources used to manage impact of COVID

- Most student reported seeking general counseling to manage the impact of COVID.
- 38% of students reported receiving emergency financial aid resources.
- 10% of students received mental health counseling as a way to manage the impact of COVID.



Aid Received

- A little more than half of graduates reported receiving an emergency grant award.
- Almost two-thirds of graduates reported receiving a transportation grant.
