1)	<p>Building a Community in connecting students to financial aid Ngo shared the Financial Aid department is offering 10-minutes classroom informative presentations to notify students of financial aid offerings and recent updates. A reminder that students can qualify for aid regardless of the number of units they are enrolled in. There have been recent changes to the FAFSA form and it is now available for students to complete. The updated streamlined forms are more user-friendly, featuring 36 questions compared to the previous 108. The updated form is intended to increase Pell Grant eligibility. Types of aid a student may qualify for include Pell Grant, loans, work-study, scholarship and waivers (CCPG). Students who usually complete the CADAA, California Dream Act Application, can also submit the 2024-25 form. Reminder it is not too late to apply for funds for Spring. Additionally, the 2024-2025 FAFSA simplification is also available. 2)	<p>ID.me identification process This is a new identification verification platform that is being introduced and implemented by the State Chancellor’s Office for all community colleges to assist in preventing fraudulent student accounts. The pilot is starting with Financial Aid. Eventually will expand to the entire student population. The system utilizes a driver’s license as verification. This is the same system used by the DMV when you apply for a RealID. A recent example of students receiving a phishing scam email from a “classmate” offering to complete their work for them. The district is reviewing these several cases. Additionally, the District will be sending out email to students warning of phishing scams and reminding that plagiarism and cheating is not tolerated at SDCCD.</p>
