## SAN DIEGO MIRAMAR COLLEGE

One of three credit colleges within the San Diego Community College District, San Diego Miramar College offers associate degrees, certificates of completion, and the first two years of a bachelor's degree. Founded in 1969, and located in Mira Mesa, the college services 16,000 students annually with 42 programs that offer 75 associate degrees and 97 career technical education certificates.

Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal (ABA approved), aviation (FAA-certified), automotive, diesel and advanced transportation and energies. Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Energy Center and the San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute, which comprises the San Diego Law Enforcement Academy and the Fire Technology & EMT program. Since 1969, the college has provided training for nearly all law enforcement and firefighters in San Diego County. Miramar College is accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) through 2031.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

# P. Wesley Lundburg, Ph.D.

I am pleased to share with you this Report to the Community and some highlights from the 2023-2024 academic year.

It was another year of growth and success for us here at San Diego Miramar College. Early in the academic year, we were greeted with the news that our application to offer our first ever baccalaureate degree was approved by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's office. Beginning fall of 2025, Miramar College will offer a Bachelor's of Science degree in Public Safety Management. This degree will align perfectly with our already robust Regional Public Safety Training Institute which educates most of San Diego's First Responders. Now these brave men and women, along with countless aspiring First Responders, will be able to take their education to the next level.

In June, at its annual meeting, the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), the regional accrediting agency that evaluates two-year colleges in California, took action to reaffirm San Diego Miramar College's accreditation for seven years through 2031. I am grateful to our faculty and staff who continue to do great work on behalf of our students and the community at-large.

In athletics, the College received approval from the San Diego Community College District Board of Trustees to add three intercollegiate sports to its athletic department. Men's soccer, men's swimming and women's swimming will begin competition during the 2024-2025 calendar year. The additions of those three sports brings our total intercollegiate sports programs to ten.

And finally, what I am most proud of is what the students accomplished in the classroom. Our degree and certification completion numbers improved greatly over the previous year.

For the 2023-2024 academic year, Miramar College conferred 1,194 degrees and another 705 Certificate of Achievements for a total of 1,899 awards.

Of the 1,194 associate degrees to be conferred, 522, or 44%, are Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADT), thus demonstrating that Miramar College will have prepared nearly half its degree earning students for transfer to a 4-year university.

What a year! We can't wait to get started on the next!

# The Amazin' Jets

Nineteen-sixty-nine was a memorable year in New York City baseball folklore. The New York Mets won a World Series Championship just a year removed from an 89-loss season. As a result of that dramatic turnaround, the hometown 9 has come to be affectionately known as the "Amazin' Mets."

Six decades later, the 2023 version of the Miramar College women's water polo team can call themselves the "Amazin' Jets!" No, they didn't rebound from losing 89 games the year prior, because they weren't even in existence the year prior. One year after the program went on hiatus, the "Amazin' Jets" returned to the pool to win the PCAC conference title for the first time in school history.

Their story begins in the summer of 2022. With less than 7 players on the roster, Athletic Director Nick Gehler made the difficult decision to cancel the season. "I told the coach at the time that we needed to get at least 7 players to participate," said Gehler. Seven players is the required minimum to compete. "We fell short of that number and I had to make a difficult call."

His next call wasn't too difficult to make. It went to a peppy 27-year old full of energy.

In December of 2022, Head Coach Lucy Gates was hired away from Palomar College, where she had won the PCAC title during the 2022 season as interim head coach. It was now her job to find players and field a team in time for the start of the 2023 season. So, Gates searched San Diego County pools for players while also acting as the head coach of the Oceanside High School girls team. "When I got the job I had to hit the ground running with recruiting efforts," said Gates. "Luckily, we had three returning players that stuck around after the canceled season, including our star goalie Rylie Hage, so I had at least those three to lean on during the process. I cast a wide net and talked to as many area seniors as I could. I tried to over recruit and it paid off."

After each game Gates coached at Oceanside, she would seek permission from the opposing coaches to address the seniors on coming to Miramar College to continue their

playing careers. As a product of a community college herself, having played at Palomar and then Cal-State Monterey Bay, Gates pushed the benefits of playing at a community college. "Recruits had to buy into my vision for the Miramar program."

Gates then hired assistant coaches Bennett Bugelli and Evan Dean, who she claims "were essential factors in our team's success," and away they went.

Along the way, the coaching staff added the offensive prowess of Poway High School's Nalani Galindo. Galindo led the Jets in scoring. On the defensive side, Chloe Fairchild showed up from nearby Clairemont High School and stepped up as the team's guard. In goal was returner Rylie Hage. "I was so grateful that Rylie stuck around, finding a talented goalie for your program at this level isn't easy," said Gates. "Rylie and the other two returners had their season robbed from them the year prior, so I just wanted to give them a great experience." And that she did. One that few could predict would come.

The 2023 season started September 8th with a 5-game winning streak, which included the Jets first of two wins over Mesa College. By late October, the Jets were 16 and 3 and headed to their first ever PCAC title. The "Amazin' Jets" wrapped up an unbeaten conference record in the regular season and then went on to win the PCAC tournament championship and qualify for the SoCal regional.



In early November, they were headed to the SoCal regionals where they would avenge an early season loss to Cuesta College in the first round. That victory set up a quarterfinals date with the state's top-seeded program Santa Barbara City College. The Jets trailed 7-5 before ultimately losing 14-6. Santa Barbara went on to win the SoCal regional and qualify for the state championship tournament. The Jets returned to Miramar College with a desire to improve in 2024 and a whole lot of post-season accolades for their efforts.

In the end, several "Amazin' Jets" earned post-season honors. First team All-PCAC selections included: **Rylie Hage**; **Chloe Fairchild**; **Erica Pircher**; and **Emma Roberson**. Second team All-PCAC selections included: **Jordy Jordison** and **Emma Fritz**. **Gabby Atta** was named honorable mention. **Nalani Galindo** and **Rylie Hage** were also named 1st Team All-Regional and All-American while **Chloe Fairchild** and **Erica Pircher** earned 2nd team All-Regional and All-American.

And as you can imagine, **Lucy Gates** was honored as PCAC Coach of the Year while **Nalani Galindo** was named PCAC Player of the Year.

With every current player on the team classified as an athletic freshman and eligible to return for next season, plus with another strong recruiting class, there's little doubt that 2024 will again be just as amazin'! ■



## MIRAMAR COLLEGE Approved to Offer Baccalaureate Degree



Miramar College has received approval from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) to offer a baccalaureate degree in Public Safety Management. Miramar College will now join its fellow San Diego Community College District institutions, Mesa College (Health Information Management) and City College (Cyber Defense and Analysis), in offering a bachelor's degree. Starting in the fall of 2025, Miramar College plans to launch its Bachelor's of Science degree in Public Safety Management. The College will now begin to build its upper-division courses through the College's Curriculum Committee in hopes of providing two clear tracks for students, one in law enforcement management and another in emergency management.

"This is great news for local students and current public safety employees looking to obtain a degree in the public safety sector," said Dr. Wes Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "Since 1969, Miramar College has been home to the San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute, which has provided training to most of the region's first responders. This bachelor's degree will not only strengthen the community's trust in us that we offer best-in-class instruction for those in public safety, but it will allow for first responders to be in line for promotions and salary advancements that come with obtaining a 4-year degree."

Sonya Christian, chancellor of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, congratulated Miramar College on its tireless efforts to secure approval in an Oct. 12 letter sent to the College. Earlier that day, the College's provisionally approved baccalaureate degree program was presented to the CCCC Board President and was granted conditional approval, pending receipt of an ACCJC substantive change approval letter. ACCJC is the official accrediting body of the California Community College system. After receipt of this approval letter from ACCJC, the Miramar College program will be fully approved and can launch.

Full approval was delayed due to duplication concerns from the California State University System. But those duplication concerns were dropped in early Oct.

The CCCC identified 10 industry sectors for prioritized resources and program development due to the labor market needs and opportunities to prepare students to compete in a global economy. Public Safety/Government was identified as an emerging sector for employment and higher wage jobs in the San Diego region. Based on this emerging sector identification and working closely with San Diego County Office of Emergency Services, San Diego Gas and Electric's Public Safety Division and first responder agencies throughout the region, the Miramar

College School of Public Safety applied to offer the Bachelor of Science: Public Safety Management degree at the end of 2022.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has ranked San Diego County 16th out of 3,142 counties nationwide on the FEMA Hazard Risk Index for the most vulnerable counties to natural disasters. The Miramar College Public Safety Management degree incorporates Governor Newsom's Initiative "Prepare California" and embeds industry certifications for disaster and emergency management planning and public safety needs to better equip law enforcement, fire, and emergency services members, first responders and allied partnerships and nonprofit organizations to be prepared for major emergencies and public safety threats most likely to encounter in the 21st century. Incorporated into the design of the curriculum will be an emphasis for place-bound students to focus on challenges in the San Diego region based on public safety threats, industry sectors, diversity in population and geographical location such as:

- Ranking for high risk for vulnerable counties to natural disasters.
- San Diego Gas and Electric (Utility Company) has developed a robust Emergency Plan including several public safety positions requiring higher education.
- San Diego is home to the nation's largest concentration of military personnel.
- There are more veterans in San Diego than there are active-duty personnel.
- The region features the largest number of Tribes and Reservations of any county in the United States.
- San Diego is home to the largest international border in the world.
- Limitations to emergency resources in the event of a disaster due to the geographical location in Southern California.

The California Community College System is the single largest provider of public safety education and training within the state servicing more than 33,500 full time equivalent students annually with public safety and services jobs comprising over 14.5% of the state's entire workforce. San Diego Miramar College is the ideal location for the proposed Bachelor of Science in Public Safety Management given workforce partnerships, industry accreditation and natural scaffolding from existing Associate of

Science degrees in Public Safety programs, especially given the identified need for future Emergency Management Director and Public Safety Management positions forecasted for employment in California.

Darren Hall, program director for the Miramar College Fire Technology Program, recently wrote in a Times of San Diego Op-Ed piece published on Oct. 10, "With the implications of climate change becoming more profound and the number and severity of natural disasters threatening our region, San Diego is in need of more well-trained emergency management professionals. Which is why San Diego Miramar College sought approval to offer a bachelor of science degree in public safety management. This industry-endorsed, faculty-driven initiative will allow students to meet the skills training and educational requirements needed to become an emergency manager at a fraction of what students must pay at four-year colleges and university."

Miramar College is perfectly suited to house such a program as the School of Public Safety already offers 10 associate of science degrees, 13 certificates of achievement, 10 certificates of performance and hosts the Regional Public Safety Training Institute.

According to the California Community College's Chancellor's Office, research has shown that community college baccalaureate programs excel at providing affordable, flexible higher education opportunities to students who are often nontraditional, low- income and place bound. By serving a racially diverse student population, community college baccalaureate programs also play a crucial role in closing equity gaps, which aligns with the goals of Vision 2030. San Diego Miramar College's program in Public Safety Management will help graduates qualify for high-wage positions in their region, bolster their upward mobility, and strengthen their communities. ■



## Accreditation Reaffirmed Through 2031

At its annual meeting June 5-6, 2024, the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), the regional accrediting agency that evaluates two-year colleges in California, took action to reaffirm San Diego

Miramar College's accreditation for seven years through 2031.

In a letter from ACCJC President Mac Powell and Chair Dr. Lori Gaskin, the Commission reaffirms that San Diego Miramar College has provided evidence that it continues to be in compliance with accreditation standards, policies and eligibility requirements. "This kind of outcome of an accreditation visit can only happen when everybody is working together toward fulfillment of the college mission," said Dr. Wesley Lundburg, president of San Diego Miramar College. "This outcome truly displays the College's commitment to student access, equity, and success."

As part of the regular seven-year evaluation cycle, a visiting team from the ACCJC reviewed the College's comprehensive Institutional Self-Evaluation Report (ISER) and interviewed dozens of San Diego Miramar College faculty, staff and students during its campus visit February 29–March 1, 2024.

Upon completion of that visit, San Diego Miramar College received one improvement recommendation from the visiting team for improving institutional effectiveness. Campus leadership has moved swiftly to address the recommendations by the visiting team.

- **Recommendation 1:** In order to increase effectiveness, the team recommends the College implement and institutionalize its plan for collection, analysis, and disaggregation of learning outcome data for student subpopulations to assist with identifying performance gaps; implement strategies, which may include investment of resources, to mitigate the gaps; and evaluate the efficacy of those strategies. (I.B.2, I.B.6)

The next report due from the College will be the Midterm Report due March 15, 2028.

Accreditation is the primary means that educational institutions assure and improve quality. California community colleges must apply to the ACCJC, which is overseen by the U.S. Department of Education. The process focuses on self-evaluation, peer review and quality improvement. Institutions are either reaffirmed or placed on sanction, which include four levels: warning, probation, show cause and termination of accreditation. ■

## Regional Public Safety Institute Receives \$500,000 in Federal Funding

Congresswoman Sara Jacobs visited San Diego Mesa College on May 31 to present a check for \$1,966,279 to the San Diego Community College District for facilities improvements at Mesa College's Family Resource Center (FRC) as well as at the Miramar College Regional Public Safety Institute.

Rep. Jacobs, whose 51st Congressional District includes both Mesa and Miramar colleges, helped secure the community project funding as part of the FY 2024 federal budget.

The largest appropriation, \$1,466,279, will benefit student parents at Mesa College, the district's largest college.

In addition, \$500,000 in congressional funding will be spent renovating the Miramar College Regional Public Safety Institute. This includes updated instructional equipment, fitness equipment, and furniture. It will also fund a crime scene investigation room to better prepare cadets. The Miramar College Regional Public Safety Institute serves as the region's police officer training facility for the San Diego's law enforcement agencies, including the San Diego County Sheriff's.

## Enters Partnership With Pt. Loma Nazarene University to Offer Bachelor Degree in Business

Point Loma Nazarene University and San Diego Miramar College have entered a 3-year partnership to support students wishing to earn a Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA). Starting in the spring of 2024, Miramar College students and alumni can pursue a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration without ever leaving the Miramar College campus.

This collaboration allows professors from PLNU's BBA program to teach business courses on Miramar College's Mira Mesa campus. Miramar College graduates and alumni, who have earned their AA, are qualified to enroll in this degree program and they will receive a 20% discount off the price of tuition. The degree program can be completed in just 6 semesters.

Miramar College will expand its intercollegiate sports programs by adding three new sports for the upcoming academic year. The athletic department will add men's soccer, men's swimming and women's swimming bringing its total intercollegiate offerings to ten sports. Men's soccer will begin competition in the fall of 2025, while the men's and women's swimming programs will begin competition in the spring of 2025. The San Diego Community College District Board of Trustees unanimously approved the development and implementation of these three new sports programs at its April 25, 2024 board meeting.

The three new programs will compete in the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC). ■

## AMR to Offer "Learn While You Earn" EMT Academy for Women

A partnership between AMR and Miramar College, the Earn While You Learn academy is a 16-week program in which cadets will be trained to become emergency medical technicians (EMT) and will be hired by AMR upon completing the academy and passing a national EMT exam, known as the Registry of EMT's exam.

AMR will cover the cadets' costs for tuition and books and pay them for the hours they attend class. Cadets will also be eligible for medical, dental, vision and 401K benefits.

"What better time to launch this academy than during Women's History Month (March)," said Carlos Valdez Acosta-Meza, an Operations Manager with AMR. "Women play a critical role in the field of emergency medical services, including here at AMR. This academy will help put more women on a promising and rewarding career path while bolstering the ranks of female EMTs and paramedics in the San Diego region."

When the cadets are not in class, they will shadow AMR paramedics and EMTs as they respond to actual emergencies across San Diego County, for which they will also be paid.

The academy will teach cadets a wide variety of EMT skills, including driving an ambulance, delivering a baby, performing CPR, using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), and administering an EpiPen to someone experiencing a life-threatening allergic reaction, among other skills.

While this is the first all-female Earn While You Learn academy that AMR has sponsored, the company has held two others over the past year and a half with women and men. ■

# The Trio That Puts “Student” in Student Athlete

You’ve probably heard the term “student-athlete” bantered around. A Miramar College trio more than puts “student” into that term. Between women’s beach volleyball players Mia Fox, Zaria Henderson, and Natalie Repetti, the trio enrolled in a total of 87 units during the spring 2024 term, at three different colleges, all for the love of volleyball.

Natalie Repetti is a graduating senior at UC San Diego where she starred on the Triton’s division one indoor volleyball team through the fall of 2023 season. After playing in 85 matches over 3 seasons for the Tritons, she decided to play beach volleyball at Miramar College during the spring. “I was in the transfer portal for Division 1 volleyball and will play next season at Alabama,” said Repetti. “I wanted to keep in shape, so here I am competing in the spring in beach volleyball.”

Repetti is one of only a few athletes nationwide to play two sports for two different institutions in the same academic year. But she’s not the first. Nor is she the only one in her own program. Her fellow UC San Diego teammate Zaria Henderson is also doing the same. Henderson played for the Tritons this past fall and now plays for the Jets beach volleyball team in the spring. Henderson is currently in the transfer portal hoping to find a new 4-year university to play beach volleyball for.

Since UC San Diego doesn’t field a beach program both athletes are eligible to play for a second school in the same year. However, you just can’t play two sports at two different schools in the same year without enrolling as a fulltime student at both institutions. And that’s where this story gets good.

Let’s also introduce you to Mia Fox. Fox is in her second year playing for the Jets volleyball program while taking a full class load at San Diego State in pursuit of her bachelor’s in Psychology.

To remain eligible to play at Miramar College and to graduate at their 4-year institutions, the trio must be fulltime students at both institutions. That means being enrolled in at least 12 units per school. In the case of Repetti, she took 32 total units. Yes, you read that correctly! Some students don’t complete that many units over a full year, let alone a student athlete. “I enrolled in 5 courses for 20 units at UCSD,” said Repetti. “I had an upper division cognitive sciences course in Neurosciences, I had two education courses, I had a cognitive science elective course, and I had a theater class. At Miramar College, I took an economics class, a philosophy class, a fashion class and a volleyball class.” How does one do it? “It’s a little stressful, but it’s nothing too crazy, said Repetti. “The UCSD classes are harder, but because I was a

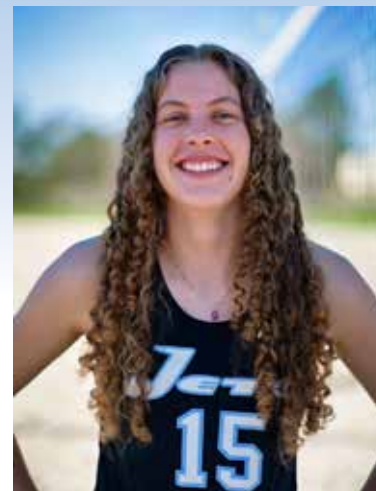

senior there, I have learned great time management.” Keep in mind, UC San Diego is on a nine-week quarter system. It can get daunting at times to make it all work. A typical day found Repetti waking up at the crack of dawn and heading to Miramar College for morning practice. She then did a weight training program required by her soon to be new school, Alabama. After lunch, it’s off to La Jolla for on campus classes at UCSD. If that’s not enough, she coached volleyball two nights a week at WAVE Volleyball club. Repetti then retired to her home to take her Miramar College classes online. Repetti and her pairs teammate Jaalyn Sotoa qualified for the California Community College Athletic Association’s SoCal Regional playoffs. On April 26, the duo won the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference’s women’s pairs championship.

Zaria Henderson is enrolled in 28 units between UC San Diego and Miramar College. This past fall, she wrapped up her third season playing for the Tritons. “I am new to beach volleyball,” said Henderson. “Playing here helps me get in the work I need to get better.”

When asked about how she manages the grind of 28 units and playing, she quipped, “You get used to it.” Henderson does admit that she often looked at Repetti during practice and asked, “How did we end up here?”

Mia Fox has taken a slightly different route. While she doesn’t compete in volleyball at San Diego State, she enrolled in 27 units during the spring between SDSU (15) and Miramar College (12). She says that in order to ease the burden,

“I took a full load of 8-week courses at Miramar College that begin in January and ended in late March. It’s tough at first, and asynchronized learning isn’t for everyone, but I find a way to get it done.” As a result, her schedule got a tad bit easier come April, but not by much. “It ends up being worth it. I do get burned out at times, but I try to ignore how tired I get.” Fox plans to graduate next fall from SDSU. If you are wondering, she also works as a volleyball coach at nearby Westview High School.

This trio of Miramar College student-athletes all qualified for the CCCAA SoCal Regionals Championships which were held May 3-4 at El Camino College in Torrance, CA.

The pairs team of Henderson and Fox advanced to the State Playoffs. ■

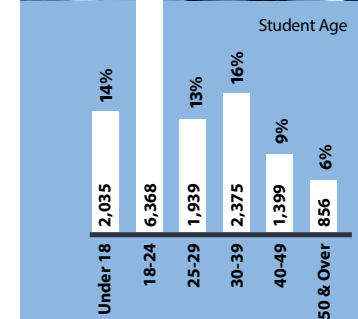
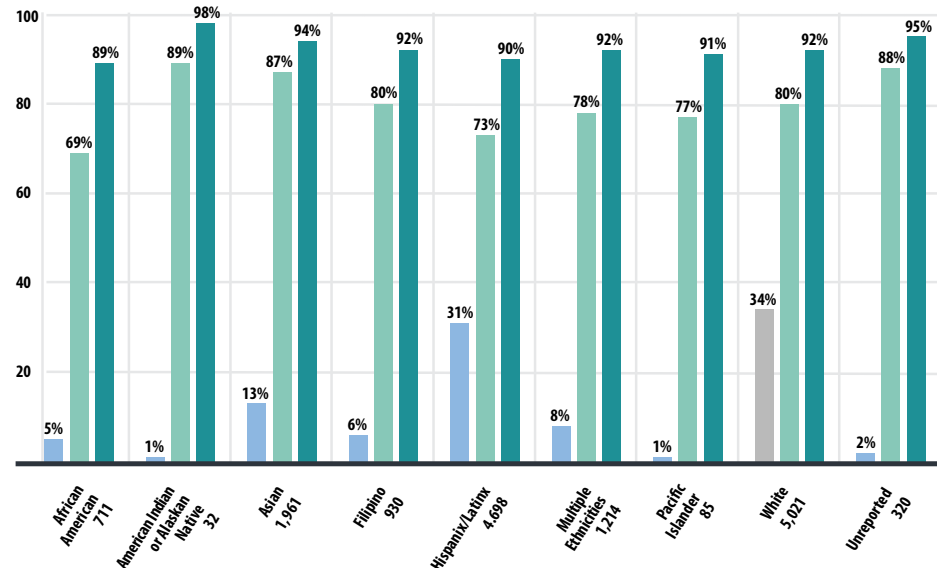


### Student Enrollment Type

## FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

# Kevin Petti: Then and Now

## How long have you worked with the District/Miramar College?

I was hired at Miramar College in 1987 as adjunct faculty, and then hired as a tenure track member of the contract faculty in 1991. I have known every Miramar College President, starting with George Yee, the first president. At this time, I am pretty sure I am the most senior member of the faculty, having taught here a total of 36 years (32 of those years as full-time faculty). Paul Chlapecka in Aviation at Miramar may have me beat by a year, not sure, but you are safe to say at the least "one of the most senior members of the faculty" but I am pretty sure I am the "most senior". It is my plan to retire at the end of the 2024-2025 academic year.

## Over your tenure of employment, what areas of study have you taught?

I have taught: Biology 160: Human Anatomy and Physiology, Biology 232: Human Dissection Experience, Health 101: Health and Lifestyle, and Exercise Science 281: Applied Anatomy and Kinesiology. I have served in the past, and now also presently serve as the Department Chair for Exercise and Nutritional Sciences; and my department chair colleagues have recently elected me the Chair of the Department Chairs Committee (fitting as the most senior department chair on campus). I am also the Miramar College Campus Representative for the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) the faculty union.

## What significant changes in the District have you seen over the years?

WOW! That is a huge question. The biggest for me is the development of the Miramar College campus. When I was hired it was a campus of bungalows atop asphalt, dusty decomposed granite parking lots, not much lighting at night, and very limited programs. I was, however, able to part of the many phased planning process that resulted in the beautiful campus we have today.

## Any particular memory stand out to you that you'd like to share?

I have a few: I remember when we tried to expand the Biology program by teaching labs in a bungalow, but that didn't work well because you couldn't keep a microscope focused as students moved in the bungalow causing it to shake too much, causing the microscope to continually go out of focus! I remember having to turn my computer keyboard upside down every morning to dump out the termite droppings that fell overnight from the ceiling in my bungalow! I remember a campus evacuation when construction workers were trenching to pull electrical to the (then) new marquee on Black Mountain Road, when they found an unexploded bomb from when the campus was a Navy landing field and practice bombing target prior to and during World War III! I remember going for a run in the northernmost, desolate part of campus, in the area of the current Transit Station and Administration Building, and having to avoid rattlesnakes and coyotes! ■



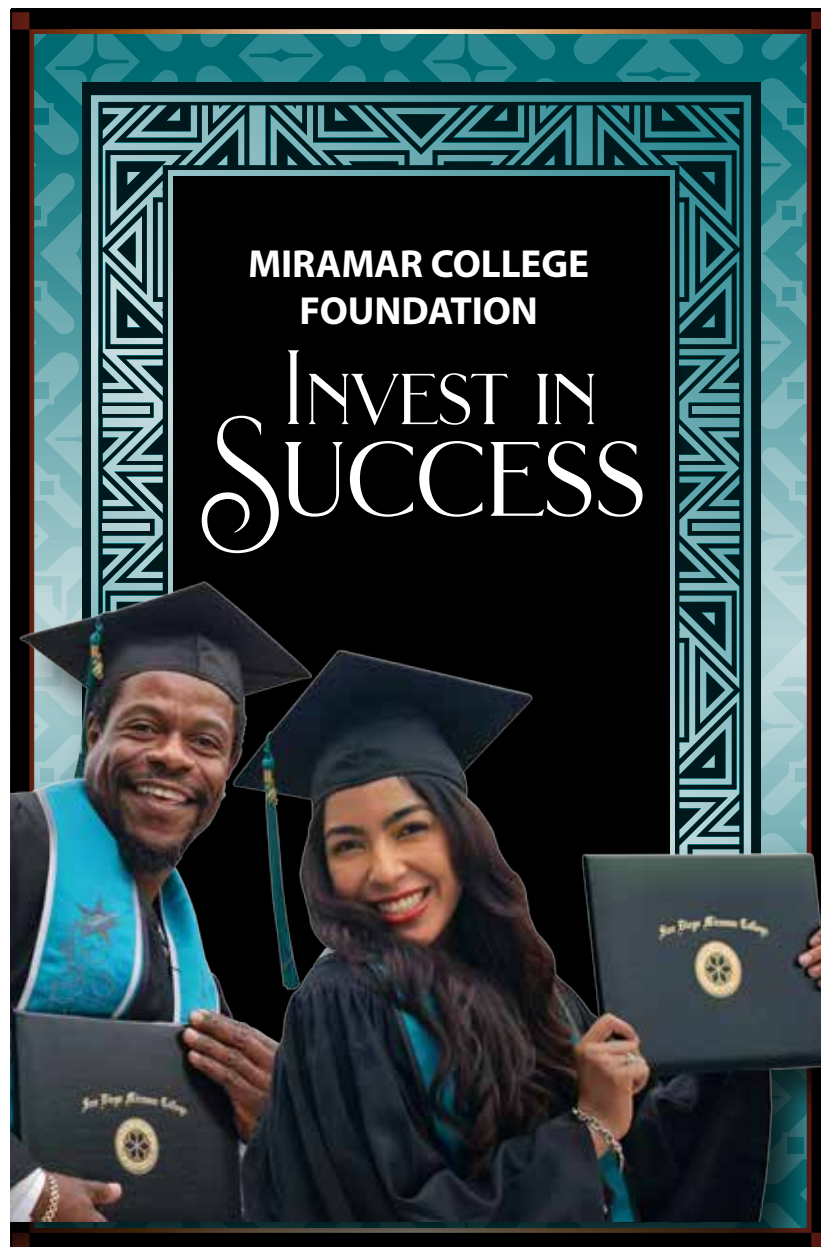

### Cassandra Mullens Illustrates Path to Success

Welcome to DSPS Alumni at Work, where we celebrate former SDCCD students and highlight how their partnership with Disability Support Programs and Services helped pave successful employment pathways. Today, we share an interview with Miramar College alum Cassandra Mullens.

#### A Welcoming Transition Point

When reflecting on her decision to pursue higher education after graduating from Mount Carmel High School in 2016, Mullens described Miramar as “a flexible and welcoming transition point from high school life to university life.” Seeking to develop her skills as a character designer and illustrator, Mullens pursued her associate’s degree in Studio Arts for Transfer, honing her skills in life drawing, painting, ceramics, and woodwork. Spending most of her time in the Art and Visual Studies building, she found guidance in professors Jessica McCambley and Joshua Eggleton.

“[They] provided helpful feedback and encouraged me to step outside my comfort zone when it came to the style and methods of my pieces,” she said.

#### Keeping a Steady Pace

As a student on the Autism spectrum, Mullens’ difficulty processing vast quantities of information and multiple steps given at once often resulted in overwhelm and overstimulation.

“This also affected my manual dexterity and spatial perception, making drawing proportionally a major challenge,” she said.

With support from Miramar College DSPS, Mullens accessed a wealth of resources and accommodations to achieve a rhythm that worked for her.

“The high-tech center provided a quiet, steady-paced environment where I could improve my focus on tasks and time management,” she said, while “the use of a DSPS recorder helped me retain information and discern how to concisely take notes.”

Mullens also expressed gratitude for the individualized support she received from DSPS staff, who were not only invested in her academic journey but also in her successful transition into the workforce. She credits her counselor Kandice Brandt with providing “invaluable advice and encouragement throughout my entire time at Miramar, which contributed greatly to my academic success” as well

as WorkAbility III Vocational Specialist Rusty Krumm, who “went above and beyond to help develop my interview skills and resume.”

## More Than Capable

After her time at Miramar, Mullens continued her studies at San Diego State University, where she graduated summa cum laude in May 2023 with a bachelor's degree in Applied Arts and Sciences with an emphasis in Multimedia. She is currently working as an assistant graphic designer for Little Fish Comic Book Studio, a nonprofit organization dedicated to teaching children and teens how to create their own comics. Her role involves creating illustrations for social media advertisements and assisting in teaching comic workshops.

“I am very fortunate to have continued to receive guidance from SDSU's alumni services and the Department of Rehabilitation,” said Mullens. “They have helped to direct my area of focus in graphic design companies to apply for and which aspects of my experience as an artist to emphasize in my resume and portfolio.”

In her role at Little Fish, Mullens embraces every opportunity to innovate.

“For each new project I’m given, a million and one ideas sprout into my head. It’s incredibly satisfying to see how the illustrations I draft on paper take on a new life when digital coloring and text is applied. Sometimes it’s a one-to-one transfer of the original sketch while other times I discover a new element or color combination that works even better.”

As for navigating some of the common workplace barriers autistic employees face, Mullens knows exactly what she needs: “So long as I receive patient and clear instructions one-on-one and have access to a small-scale setting to produce my art, I’m more than capable of thriving.”

## Words of Wisdom

We asked Mullens for any words of wisdom she might provide to prospective SDCCD students with disabilities looking to further their education and employment prospects.

“Self-advocacy and reaching out is the key to ensuring that you can get the accommodations to help you thrive in the classroom,” she said. “Every student with disabilities deserves to have a strong support system that builds them up so they can cultivate their talents and succeed in their fields.”

Mullens also emphasized the need for increased opportunities in the arts specifically, noting the many instances where she and her college counselors had to “dig for those.”

On a broader accessibility level, Mullens (whose disability prohibits her from driving) advocates for low-cost subsidized ride services to help reduce the stress and unpredictability associated with public transportation.

## Never Stop Fighting

As Mullens works toward becoming a character designer with an emphasis in creature design, she’s also partnering with another non-profit to develop entrepreneurial skills, sell her art, and create her own studio. In her spare time, she enjoys reading books (zoology, paleontology, mythology and animation) and dabbles in baking - chocolate chip cookies are her specialty!

In closing, Mullens wants readers to know that she tries to live life in accordance with this E.E Cummings passage from “A Poet’s Advice to Students”:

*To be nobody but yourself in a world which is doing its best, night and day, to make you everybody else, means to fight the hardest battle you are ever going to fight. Never stop fighting.*

DSPS is in your corner, Cassandra! (Though we strive alongside alumni like you to create a different kind of world with fewer battles to fight and more cookies to bake!)

## Under the Hood with John Loewenberg

John Loewenberg, a Miramar College student who is now a vital part of the college's Automotive Technology Program as an Instructional Laboratory Technician.

### Test Driving College

Loewenberg's love for the automotive world began early, and he knew he wanted to turn his passion into a career. After graduating from Poway High School in 2010, he embarked on his higher education journey at Miramar College in 2011. He chose Miramar because of its cost-effective tuition and the academic flexibility it offered. He was

eager to test drive various subjects while remaining committed to his true passion: automotive technology.

Loewenberg fondly remembers his first years at Miramar, citing Mark Anderson's Health 101 class as a particular highlight.

"He made his class atmosphere fun and lighthearted, which made learning easy, especially since I was nervous about being at a new school," said Loewenberg, who also noted the professor's incredible support in providing disability accommodations.

### Navigating Roadblocks

Loewenberg, who has a social anxiety disorder, described how even the simplest academic and social interactions felt like daunting challenges. Group projects, speaking in class, and making friends, for example, all felt like "navigating a minefield."

"Every time you have to interact," he said, "there was this nagging fear of being judged or saying the wrong thing."

The anxiety wasn't just in his head; it brought physical symptoms like shaky hands and a racing heart. At first, these challenges negatively impacted Loewenberg's academic performance.

"My grades took a hit because I'd sometimes avoid classes or group study sessions, just to steer clear of those anxiety-inducing situations."

Fortunately, he recalled, Miramar faculty and staff recognized the obstacles in Loewenberg's path and "offered the support, counseling, and resources to help students like me get through it."

### Preparing for the Road Ahead

Tapping into student services like Miramar DSPS not only enhanced Loewenberg's academic success; it prepared him for the workforce.

After completing the two-year Honda PACT program at Miramar College in 2013, Loewenberg transitioned to a full-time position at Hoehn Honda in Carlsbad. In 2016, Miramar College welcomed him as an Instructional Lab Technician, where he subsequently achieved his ASE Master Technician status.

### From the Driver's Seat

Loewenberg finds his role at Miramar incredibly rewarding. He enjoys teaching students and takes pride in witnessing them grasp challenging concepts.

**“DISABILITY SUPPORT DOESN'T JUST HELP IN SCHOOL; IT SETS YOU UP WITH SKILLS THAT ASSIST IN THE WORKPLACE AND THE REST OF YOUR LIFE,” he said. “THESE SERVICES [TEACH STUDENTS TO] SPEAK UP FOR THEMSELVES, GET HANDS-ON WITH ASSISTIVE TECH TOOLS, GET TO PRACTICE TIME MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATION. IF YOU’RE EVER TORN ABOUT DISCLOSING YOUR DISABILITY AT WORK, THE EXPERIENCES WITH THESE SERVICES CAN GUIDE YOU.”**

“It feels good knowing I might have helped in some way. It’s not about grand changes, but those tiny steps of progress,” he said.

When asked how he might advise prospective students with disabilities, Loewenberg encourages a trifecta approach of self-advocacy, self-care, and celebration.

“Don’t be afraid to seek out the accommodations you need and lean on them,” he said, adding that DSPS representatives can offer insights, tips, and that comforting feeling of not being alone. “Remember to prioritize self-care; it’s not just a buzzword. Taking breaks, finding relaxing activities, or even seeking counseling can be great outlets. Lastly, always remind yourself of your achievements, no matter how small. Every step forward is a victory. With determination and the right support, you’ve got this!”

As for students transitioning into the workforce, Loewenberg believes that companies should prioritize understanding and compassion.

“I’ve seen instances where profit and efficiency overshadow human compassion and understanding,” he said. “It’s disheartening to think of others who might feel overwhelmed or excluded. It’s essential for companies not only to make physical accommodations but also to foster a culture that values every individual’s contribution, recognizing the strength in diversity.”

No matter what students face in the classroom and beyond, Loewenberg wants them to know they can reach out to him for support.

### On the Horizon

Outside the classroom, Loewenberg loves spending quality time with his dad in the garage, continuing the family tradition of tinkering on 1960’s Chevy hot rods.



**“It’s more than just a dive into mechanics or reliving automotive nostalgia,” he said. “The time working together has been a binding force, linking me with the wisdom and memories of both my dad and granddad.”**

He hopes to become a father one day, perhaps passing on the wisdom and memories to his own child.

“I’m eager to embrace the mysteries ahead and whatever life has in store for me,” he said.

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## DSPS Alumni at Work: Randy Claros

The DSPS Alumni at Work series showcases the journeys of former San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) students who, with the help of the Disability Support Programs and Services (DSPS), have succeeded in their educational and professional paths. In this edition, we're happy to spotlight Randy Claros, a counselor at Miramar College who brings a wealth of experience and passion to his role.

### Embracing Resources

Claros' higher education journey began at San Diego State University, where he initially explored Kinesiology and Social Sciences before choosing Psychology as his major. As a first-generation student with undiagnosed disabilities, navigating the college experience proved quite difficult.

"I felt that I was smart enough for college, but it just didn't click. I wasn't able to manage academically," he said.

After landing on academic probation several times, Claros was eventually disqualified from SDSU. What changed the game was a visit to the ombudsman's office, where he was encouraged to explore the community college route and consider testing for disability services eligibility.

"It was, at that point, a stigma," he said. "But it got to the point where I'm like, 'Okay, I need to start looking into that particular resource.'"

Randy soon discovered that he had auditory processing speed issues and was diagnosed with ADHD. Understanding these challenges allowed him to embrace the resources available to him, which transformed his college experience as he transitioned his studies to Miramar College.

"When I first received my accommodations, I was kind of hesitant," Randy admits. "I didn't know if I wanted to tell my professors about my disability. I didn't know if I deserved these accommodations. I felt like I was cheating the system, but I'm not."

With the support of accommodations and DSPS staff at Miramar, Randy saw a remarkable improvement in his grades and his confidence. He eventually transferred back to SDSU to complete his bachelor's degree in psychology, and went on to San Jose State University to earn his master's, continuing to utilize accommodations along the way.

### Empowering Others

Claros spent nearly a decade as a counselor and instructor at Foothill-De Anza Community College District in Los Altos Hills, CA before returning to San Diego to be near family. In a full circle moment, he joined Miramar College as a counselor and professor in 2016.

"Miramar was the one that solidified my DSPS status," he said. "I wanted to give back to the college that helped me out in my college journey."

Claros' commitment to making a difference for students fuels his dedication at Miramar. His unique insight as a former DSPS student, a first



generation student of color, and member of the LGBTQ+ community allows him to connect with students with potential undisclosed disabilities among other intersecting marginalized identities, guiding them toward proven resources for enhanced success.

**"If I'm vulnerable with students, if I share my own experiences and my multiple identities that I have and how these services help me grow and help me do well, I think hopefully that would impact students as well," he said.**

#### Looking Ahead

Claros is looking forward to starting a doctorate program at Capella University in January. Despite pursuing an advanced degree and encouragement from colleagues to climb the administrative ladder, his priority is staying "as close to students as possible" to directly affect change in their lives.

Beyond academia, Claros has his sights set on traveling and seizing the opportunity to explore the world. First up is an eastern Mediterranean cruise in 2024, with Asia and South and Central America on the bucket list!

At home and abroad, on campus and off, we wish Randy nothing but smooth sailing in the years to come! ■

## EDUCATION: REC Innovation Lab Cuts Ribbon on New Facility

San Diego Miramar College's Regional Entrepreneurship Center REC Innovation Lab is a startup incubator focused on helping women and minority entrepreneurs from diverse backgrounds to launch scalable, high growth business startups. And unlike other incubators around San Diego County, the REC Lab is uniquely situated on the community college campus.

At the REC lab, students learn how to take their startup to the next level by acquiring the skills required to pitch investors in hopes of obtaining venture capital to grow their business and receive resources for business and career development, training on cutting-edge technology such as virtual reality and artificial intelligence, the latest tools, and a broad and diverse network of industry experts to support them.

Many of the students are veterans, minorities, women, first-generation college students, and people who would not typically join an incubator without the REC.

In 2020 51% of REC student founders were women, 71% were racial or ethnic minorities, 18% were black, and they range in age from 15 – 72 years.

During the semester, students practice pitching to mentors and real-life Venture Capitalists often gaining valuable feedback that leads to funding.

"Unlike traditional incubators that charge money or take equity, we are able to provide resources through classes," said Tanya Hertz, executive director of the REC Innovation Lab and associate professor of entrepreneurship at Miramar College. "Entrepreneurs who want help starting a company can sign up for the REC by taking the BUSE 229 class at Miramar College, offered each semester for just \$46 a unit. As long as you have taken a basic

Introduction to Entrepreneurship class, then you are eligible to join the REC. If you are ready to join now and have life-experience, we can even waive the prerequisite."

The lab initially opened online during the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic 2020 and was entirely remote, then moved around into classrooms around campus until settling into its own spot last year on the ground floor of the school's Diesel Technology Building. Miramar College is officially cutting the ribbon on the new REC Lab Jan. 24.

### Small Biz Success Stories

Hertz said there are already dozens of the successful businesses that have started because of the program, including hundreds of small food-based businesses and MEHKOs that have gone through the REC as part of the San Diego Food Justice G.E.T. Cooking Program. Last year, a G.E.T. Cooking grant allowed Miramar College to distribute \$750,000 in micro-grants ranging from \$2,500 to \$7,500 to more than 200 program participants in addition to providing them with technical assistance and business education.

The REC Lab has helped many local entrepreneurs get going, Hertz said, including Anh Pham, the CEO and Founder of Earth Fan Surf Company, a business that manufactures and sells eco-friendly wood bodyboards, and Ruth Young-Loeza, a former hospital housekeeper who founded NEET SHEETS, a revolutionary bedding innovation that has transformed the way to make beds.



## **Hertz said another of the REC Lab's successes has been Alive Ferments LLC.**

Founded in 2020 and first launched in 2022 by Italy-born brothers Niccolo and Sasha Frascchetti, Alive Ferments has helped more than 5,000 people improve their gut health by making it easy to integrate probiotic fermented foods into their diets. Their products are in more than 60 natural grocery stores across California and in

Utah, Nevada and Hawaii. Niccolo Frascchetti credited Hertz and the REC program for helping the brothers head in the right direction.

"I was able to find a supportive environment where we learned how to do things hands-on instead of just in theory," he said. "A lot of it was demystifying everything that it seemed like we couldn't do ourselves and felt like we had to pay someone else to do it. That wasn't the case. Tanya would say, 'This is how you do it. I'm not doing it for you, but I'll show you how to do it.'"

The business has grown its revenue by almost 40% in 2023 compared to 2022. Currently bootstrapped with no debt, he said Alive Ferments is looking to acquire investment to expand to other distribution networks and increase online sales. Frascchetti said the company is currently seeking investors who are aligned with its values and goals: "Promoting healthy, sustainable and innovative food products to share with the world."

"We are looking to bring influential individuals or organizations on board from the industry who can contribute their expertise and connections to further enhance the company's growth and success," he said. The Frascchettis' journey into the culinary world began with a deep-rooted appreciation for wholesome food and a commitment to preserving local traditions, Sasha Frascchetti said.

"Growing up in rural Tuscany, our family always prioritized nourishing meals prepared from scratch," he said. "This was a time when the older generations were starting to embrace processed and refined foods as a sign of progress, while simultaneously cherishing their love for traditional local cuisine. This stark contrast ignited our desire to bridge the gap between these two worlds."
