
Miramar Al Network





Discussion Notes & Reflections:

Below are some of the notes that I wrote on the whiteboard, that served as items for further conversation on the subject of AI.

Included are some of my reflections on the conversation that emerged:

"It is the future at Miramar!"

I certainly agree with the sentiment. It is a reminder that innovation is upon us once more and that new technologies have emerged that are shaking up old realities and leading to the establishment of new norms and new pedagogies in response to these tools that we've had now for nearly 3 years. Some careers and degrees will disappear and new ones will take their place.

The conversation was also a reminder that academic freedom aside, there is more and more national and state-wide support for "Al Literacy," which means that taking proper steps to prepare for a future with more Al in the classroom, even if your intention is to ban the technology entirely. Al is no passing fad and will have a lasting impact on human cognition moving forward. Whether we're ready for it or not, Al is the future at Miramar... as well as City, Mesa, Continuing Education and the entire educational system.

"I feel a responsibility to learn about it"

This was one that caught me off-guard, although I share in the sense of reponsponsibility. It was refreshing to know that there are others out there, like me, that feel the FOMO (fear of missing out) as they attempt to keep up with the rapid pace of AI development. That there are others, like me, that recognize the urgent need to remain capable of guiding, nurtuing, and teaching the students that come to our institutions of learning expecting to be prepared for the world they will venture into — and the jobs of tomorrow, many of which are already here today.

It was great to see that in a room full of people who recognize the dangers of AI, who acknowledge the unethical origins of LLM training and the environmental challenges these new technologies bring with them, that there's a recognition that "the train has left the station" and rather than decry that there is even a train, we'll need to reckon with this technology and find ways to support ourselves and our students in navigating this new landscape.

"Students are already using it"

Ironically enough, this one made me think of my own complicity in this reality. As I've shared before, I brought ChatGPT into my classroom the day after it launched in Nov of 2022. The rhetorician in me saw far too much opportunity to talk critically about writing and authorship and publishing, even IP (intellectual property). And these students exited my classroom expecting further critical conversations on this important emerging technology, but found mainly faculty policing their usage and putting their work into question.

So, some students are, indeed, already using it, some successfully and others poorly, with most issues still stemming from a lack of understanding about how to use it critically and ethically.

"When used correctly, ethically and critically, AI can become a powerful tool for equity"

This was by far one of my favorite takeaways from the conversation. A diverse body sharing concerns and insights discussing whether or not AI can serve the purpose of equity, asking what happens to those who don't learn to use it ethically and critically. What happens to those who don't learn to recognize the deepfakes? Without doing so, can we continue to claim that we're equipping students with digital literacy in this digital age?
