Note 1: The following suggested two-year course sequence is intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree at a transfer institution in an art- related major. This degree is designed to accommodate the differing requirements of a wide variety of transfer institutions and major options. Because admission and major preparation requirements vary at each transfer institution, courses used to complete this degree should be selected with the assistance of a Miramar College counselor.

Note 2: Additionally, completion of Electives as needed to meet minimum of 60 units required for the degree.
