Note 1: The following suggested two-year course sequence is intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree at a transfer institution in Studio Art. This degree is designed to accommodate the differing requirements of a wide variety of transfer institutions and major options. Because admission and major preparation requirements vary at each transfer institution, courses used to complete this degree should be selected with the assistance of a Miramar College counselor.

- Note 2: Only one ARTF course from the required list may be used to satisfy SDCCD General Education requirements.

- Note 3: The removal of the Foreign Language Requirement was submitted to the Curriculum Committee in the Spring of 2016 and is in the process of being deleted.
